Railway Affairs.

Sir Joseph Flavelle, who is high up in Government and commercial affairs in Canada gave a very interesting speech to the Board of Trade at Toronto this past week.

Sir Joseph is the Chairman of the Board of Directors now looking after the Grand Trunk Railway, and told his audience that he had been asked to become a Director to re-organize the Canadian Government Railway affairs.

He was sorry for the Grand Trunk shareholders, but they had themselves to blame in trying to manage this Railway from London, and not selecting men who knew local conditions.

The "Canadian Northern" he said came to Parliament so often for money that their welcome was worn out. Sir Joseph gave further facts and figures showing what an immense problem these Railway matters are for Canada, as they have been for many years. If reports are true, they are far too generous with politicians, and it is these surmises which make the people sore. They want to see every dollar of their money utilized to the best advantage for the benefit of the Railway and the country in general.

These loans are a matter of business, and must be treated in a business like manner. The country must know how every dollar of it is spent, and keep a tight purse string.

We would gladly back up Mr. R. C. Morgan as new General Manager, if it was only to bring new blood into our Railway affairs, but how can we expect to get an ideal man from Winnipeg. He is coming here for six months this time, and will have a chance to see something of steamship connections with our Railway, that he never saw in Winnipeg. It looks to us as if we were making a far greater mistake than ever the "Grand Trunk" made in the selection of their Managers.

There is a good story told about Captain Delaney in the S.S. "Bruce" years ago. Reid had just taken over the Railway, and were determined to have everything going on schedule time. Capt. Delaney had just arrived at Port aux Basques several hours late having passed the night in a terrific gale for which the Cabot Straits are noted.

Reid's dispatch clerk wired Capt. Delaney to give good reasons why he was not up to time, but the reply he got was: they had been berry-picking in the Gulf.

A Railway Manager must know his men thoroughly, and be well acquainted with local conditions before he can think of running a Railway successfully, and we know of no place where this is more applicable than here.—Trade Review.

Busy Week Ahead.

More Work for Longshoremen.

Eight steamers with large inward freights will arrive here next week and will be leaving here with big outward cargoes. Pending their arrival fish in casks is being hurried to the various steamship sheds and the busy scenes to be perceived there are very reminiscent of the old prosperous times, which appearing to be looming once more on the horizon. S.S. Sachem is due Monday from Halifax and after discharging a big inward cargo will load up with fish and fishery products. The Canadian-Sapper will arrive on Tuesday and will have full freight, going and coming. S.S. Hika III, Hop and Godmund will all three arrive during the week, with coal cargoes and will load up with fish for Mediterranean ports. S.S. Manoa with a big flour cargo, and S.S. Sabie I, with a full general cargo, will arrive on Monday, and the Rosalind, which is due on Thursday next will complete the busiest week along the waterfront for many months.

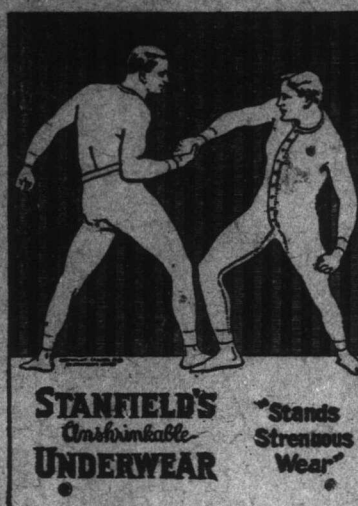
