TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DE VALERA MUST SPEAK.

DUBLIN, March 8. The Freeman's Journal, discussing the Limerick situation to-day, dealt with what it described as "Ramon De Valera's silence," and said editorially, "De Valera so far as is known has taken no step to correct the deeds of hot-headed persons, who, pretending to be his followers, have invaded Limerick and quartered themselves in that city as its inhabitants. Thanks to the self-control of the rank and file of the Irish Republican Army, actual violence, so far, has been averted. The situation, however, in the city is impossible, and, full of danger. Any conflict at the present moment would be an outrage on the Irish nation, and its name throughout the world. It behooves De Valera to speak and let the world know where he stands."

PREACHING THE BOYCOTT.

DUBLIN, March 8. De Valera attended a meeting yesterday, in Belfast, of Sinn Fein representatives from Counties Antrim, Down, Armagh, Londonderry, Fermanagh, and Tyrone, to discuss "the campaign of anarchy in north-west Ulster, and murder outrages on Nationalists, on account of their religion." According to an official Sinn Fein announcement, resolutions were adopted demanding that Dall Eileann reimpose the trade boycott against Ulster, and reaffirming non-recognition by Sinn Fein of the Belfast Parliament.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

LONDON, March 8. The Commons, yesterday, permitted by a vote of 208 to 69, Lord Robert Cecil to introduce a bill designed to give women the franchise on the same terms as men. It would enfranchise 5,000,000 women.

TRANQUIL IN LIMERICK.

LIMERICK, March 8. The situation here remained tranquil yesterday, although additional forces of the Irish Republican Army arrived from Kilkenny. On the invitation of the Mayor, officers of Free State troops and Irish Republicans met at a luncheon to informally discuss the situation. Later the Mayor went to Dublin to continue negotiations for a moderation of the controversy.

LENIN'S DESIRE.

MOSCOW, March 8. Nikolai Lenin, after a long rest in the country, last night spoke before a Congress of Metal Workers and expressed a desire personally to go to Genoa and meet Premier Lloyd George face to face.

A NEW CONTENDER.

ESSEX, Mass., Mar. 9. The fishing schooner Puritan, built as a probable contender for the International Fishermen's Trophy, will be launched at the shipyards of J. F. James and Sons on Saturday. The vessel, which will spend the season halibut fishing, is being built by the Manta Club of Gloucester. Captain Jeff Thomas of Gloucester will be her skipper. The Puritan is smaller than the Mayflower, which was barred last year from the races on the ground that she was more of a yacht than a fisherman, is the result of plans of Captain Ben Pine, of Gloucester, her managing owner, and other Gloucester men at Halifax last fall, when the Elsie of Gloucester was defeated by the Bluenose of Lunenburg.

ON THEIR WEDDING TOUR.

LONDON, March 9. Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles left to-day for Paris. They were almost overwhelmed by the salutations of a great crowd. They are on their way to Italy, and plan to spend an extended time at Florence.

OFFICIAL OPENING.

OTTAWA, March 9. His Excellency the Governor General, will at three o'clock this afternoon, formally open the fourteenth Parliament of Canada.

AND THERE YOU ARE.

MOSCOW, March 9. "Soviet Russia's economic retreat has ended, and will go no further in its concessions to capitalism," Nikolai Lenin told a congress of metal workers in a brief speech, discussing the

Genoa Conference and Russia's internal problems. Simultaneously Lenin Krasin, in an interview, declared that Soviet Russia would not abandon her control of foreign trade.

A NEW REPRESENTATION.

DUBLIN, March 9. T. Smiddy, Professor of Economics at the University College of Cork, will be Dall Eileann's new representative in Washington, succeeding Harry C. Boland, it was announced yesterday.

HANGING ON.

PARIS, March 9. France and other European countries are awaiting United States Senate ratification of Disarmament Conference agreements before submitting them to their respective parliaments, according to a statement made by Premier Poincare, and M. Serrault of the French delegates to that conference before the Senate Committee on foreign affairs, and navy, yesterday. They added information that ratification of United States Senate was likely to carry reservations, thereby settling other signatories to make equivalent modifications in Pacific and naval limitation treaties. France's difficulties at Washington would be shown when the minutes of the conference were published as United States, it is reported, intends doing.

THE SITUATION IN INDIA.

LONDON, March 9. India's appeal for Turkish rights urging the necessity for a revision of the Sevres Treaty, in view of an intense Mohammedan feeling in that country, has stirred public opinion here and has created a sensation. The appeal has aroused resentment in a large section of the Press against the Earl of Reading, Viceroy of India, and his Council. Every London newspaper this morning vigorously condemns a message, presumably addressed by the Government of India to Edwin Montagu, Secretary of State for India, and all newspaper critics characterize the action as unprecedented. They imply that an appeal was made over the heads of the British Government. It is complained that India's demands are calculated to cause the British Government embarrassment in its dealings with the signatories of the Sevres Treaty.

English editors take it for granted that this movement has been launched in India to influence proceedings at the Conference in Paris, on March 22, when Great Britain, France and Italy hope to discuss a settlement in the Near East. Some critics suggest that Sir Edwin Montagu, convinced in the issuance of this appeal for this very purpose, and indeed it is generally assumed in well informed circles that the British Government must have been aware of its despatch from India before it appeared in the newspapers.

THE VAGARIES OF DYNAMITE.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., March 9. One man, James Judge, of Buffalo, was killed, and ten were seriously injured yesterday afternoon by a dynamite explosion during blasting operations on a tunnel construction job.

SEEKING EXTRANEUS AID.

DUBLIN, March 9. A delegation of prominent advocates of the Sinn Fein State will leave for United States on the Aquitania, Saturday. They are to put the case of the treaty before Irish residents in America. The De Valera supporters are reported to be sending a rival mission, which may possibly sail on the Aquitania also.
