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At the House.

ESTIMATES AGAIN DEBATED.

The Estimates were again before the House yesterday afternoon and some progress was made in putting them through. Question time although interesting, was not so to the extent that had been expected in view of the nature of some of the papers for the Government which were on the Order Paper.

ENQUIRY INTO GUARANTEES.

The Prime Minister told Mr. Moore that the total amount given out in the way of poor relief at Rose Blanche was \$73.82. This amount had been delivered by the relieving officer, but whether in cash or supplies, Sir Richard was unable to say. Sir Michael Cashin was told that no money for the purchase of Fishery Supplies would be given to the Union Trading Co. this year. He was told that all Government guarantees would be fully enquired into. In this connection there would be no discrimination.

The reply to the question concerning the reason for the cessation of the publication of signatures to the Board of Trade petition was a quibble, pure and simple. The Prime Minister said that no representations were made to him by the Captain of H. M. S. Cambrion to the effect that the publication of names should cease. This was common knowledge, the fact being that the representations of the Cambrion Captain had been made to the Governor, who passed them on to the Prime Minister. The answer led Sir Michael Cashin to ask why the publications had been stopped. The Prime Minister, after some hesitation, replied that the gentlemen who signed the petition were not anxious to find themselves associated with some of the signatories. The Prime Minister could not say definitely where Hon. Mr. Coaker is at the moment. The latter part of the question asking if a commission would be appointed to search for the missing Minister and if its chairman would receive a knighthood was overlooked.

SMALL REDUCTIONS.

When the House went into Committee of the Whole of Supply, the Prime Minister moved the passing of the Civil Government vote. He explained that the Legislative Councilors would have their remuneration reduced from \$250 to \$120, that the Leader of the Government in that House would have his salary cut in two, and that there would be a total saving of \$3,040.

In the Lower House, seasonal pay of outport members had been reduced to \$600 and that the city members to \$600. The cost of the publication of debates will be decreased by \$200, and the vote for new books for the Legislative Library will be taken out. The saving in the Lower House is \$12,650.

This vote was passed and the House was about to proceed with the Department of the Colonial Secretary, when Mr. Walsh rose to make some observations on the Estimates.

A WARNING UNHEEDED.

Mr. Walsh first referred to the warning which the Opposition had sounded when the Estimates were increased two years ago. The seeds sown then by the Government were now bearing fruit. If they really intended to reduce the Estimates, they should begin at Government House and work down. There should be no discrimination. He did not think it was much good to cut down the Estimates by two hundred thousand and then to give way to the same old habits of squandering as soon as the House had closed. Mr. Walsh resented the inference of the Government that the blame for the guarantee of fishery supplies last year should be placed on the shoulders of the Opposition. He also resented the imputation that his district was responsible for great losses. He referred to the small returns which the Union Trading Company had made for the large amount they had received. He said there should be an immediate investigation into this matter. If it was correct that several supplying merchants received payment from the fishermen and did not make returns to the treasury, they should be compelled to make good immediately.

SHOULD GIVE FULL QUOTA. The Legislative Councilors, he said, should not accept any remuneration at all. They were all gentlemen who could afford to get along without the small salaries they received each session and they should be ashamed to receive the money of a poor people. The Mounted Police should, said Mr. Walsh, be disbanded, but the vote should remain and should be given out in the shape of old age pensions. Referring to the oil question, he said that we should not be compelled to pay fifty or sixty cents per gallon when the price in the United States was sixteen cents per gallon. A Government purchasing agent should be sent away to obtain the necessary amount of oil for the prosecution of the fishery and this should come in duty free and should be sold at cost price. If something of this nature was not done it would again be necessary to dole out pauper relief. The Government has added to the depression of the country by unwarranted interference with trade and by criminal extravagance.

Before concluding his speech, Mr. Walsh made reference to a personal matter in connection with hospital fees. An explanation of this matter was made by the Minister of Finance and Customs after which the small votes previously referred to were passed, and the House adjourned till this afternoon.
