SHIP IN COLLISION.
LONDON, Oct. 14.
S.S. Empress of Britain at South-
ampton, yesterday, reported shortly
after leaving Cherbourg yesterday
morning that the Spanish steamer
Nadia collided with Empress, pen-
etrating plates to a depth of three feet.
Both proceeded.

CAN GET BUNKER.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.
All restrictions upon a supply of
bunker coal to ships of United States
and foreign, at all United States
ports have been removed. It was an-
nounced yesterday.

QUEBEC LEGISLATURE.
QUEBEC, Oct. 14.
Preparations are being made for
the opening of the next session of the
Provincial Legislature, which will
take place on Tuesday, October 24.

EVACUATING THRACE.
ADRIANOPLE, Oct. 14.
Evacuation by Greek troops of east-
ern Thrace is due to begin to-day, and
it is reported that Greek commanders
have been given orders to withdraw at
once.

LABOR IS SANGUINE.
LONDON, Oct. 14.
A call to labor to rally to win the
coming electoral fight, is a big type
feature on the front page of the La-
bor Organ, Herald, to-day. It says a
general election is imminent, and the
tide is with labor, and if the oppor-
tunity is taken by men and women
workers throughout the country, it
will lead to a great electoral triumph.
Four hundred seats in parliament will
be contested by laborites.

FRANCE IN NEW ROLE.
PARIS, Oct. 16.
An inspired note, issued yesterday,
in answer to Lloyd George's Manches-
ter speech, places France in the role
of peace maker in the Near East crisis.
"at Great Britain's request," de-
claring that Great Britain, when fear-
ing her forces at the scene of trouble,
not sufficient to stop the advance of
the Turks, sent Curzon to France, re-
questing Poincare to use his influen-
ce with the Angora Government to
check the Turkish advance. There
followed the departure of M. Franklin

CHINA'S TROUBLES INCREASE.
AMOY, CHINA, Oct. 16.

an Independent Government in Foo
Chow, capital of Fukien Province,
which his army captured with little
fighting on the evening of October

DUE TO CURRENTS.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 16.
Captain Whittle and fifteen mem-
bers of the crew of the wrecked
Gloucester schooner, Marshall Poch,
arrived here Sunday on the Govern-
ment steamer Stanley, and leave to-
day for Boston. Captain Whittle said
he thought his schooner was fourteen
miles south of Sable Island when she
stranded, and blames the accident
upon strong currents, which carried
vessel off her course.
