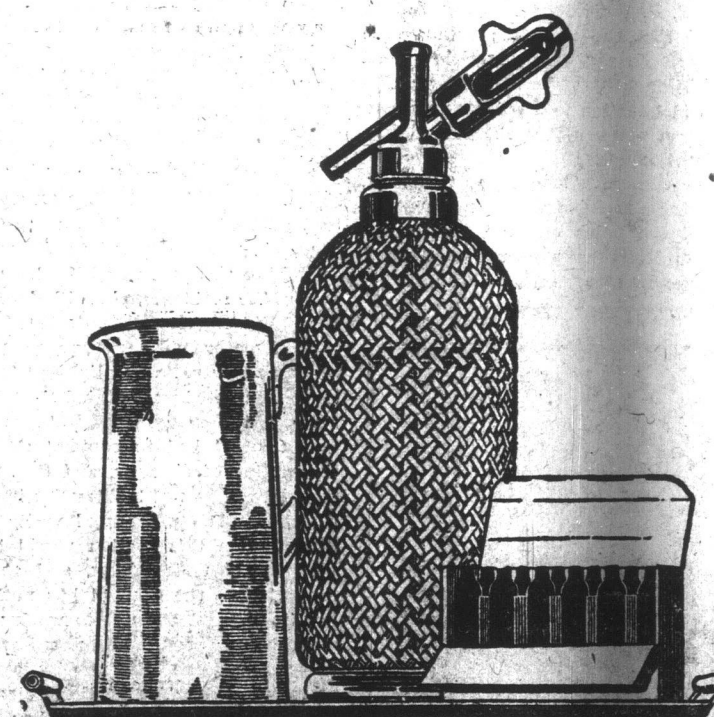
THE MAN WHO GETS PROMOTED.

SIMLA, (Canadian Press).—German merchandise is rapidly replacing Japanese wares in the markets of India according to the reports of trade investigators made public here. During the war, with the supply of German

and other European goods cut off, Japanese manufacturers found India a profitable sales territory and shipped huge quantities of all sorts of merchandise to the Hindus, Moslems and Parsee shops. These stores are now practically barren of Japanese goods and German merchandise is again flooding the market. German salesmen are now penetrating Tibet by the Youngshung route.
