proved to be a very enjoyable one.

Messrs Macklin, Pittman Bros., Ham-

evening.

## GRAND RALLY IN WEST END.

Spacious Hall Filled to Hear  
Weeks Report.

Sir M. P. Cashin Describes Awful Con-  
ditions as the Result of Coaker-Squires  
Rule—Bennett Candidates Will Have  
Record Majorities.

There was another large gathering  
at the West End Headquarters last  
night, the rooms being filled to capac-  
ity, and hundreds having to be con-  
tent with standing room. The second  
canvass of the District started last  
night when pamphlets were distribut-  
ed. Mr. Linegar, the popular labour  
representative, addresses the meet-  
ing. He told of the splendid canvass  
they had made during the day, when  
their house to house calls started in  
No. 5 ward. They had given the  
Government candidates a head start to  
see what story they had to tell. They  
saw every kind of conditions  
during that canvass, and the sights  
that met their eyes, was positive proof  
of the mismanagement of the affairs  
of the country by the Squires' Govern-  
ment. Women in St. John's to-day  
are praying that the Bennett party  
will be returned to power so that the  
privations and destitution they are  
experiencing may be done away with,  
and the country brought back to nor-  
mal. From the reception they had re-  
ceived Mr. Linegar was more than  
convinced that St. John's West was  
for Bennett and Better Times.

MAINLY ABOUT THE HUMBER  
DEAL.  
Mr. Arthur English was next asked  
to speak, and he, like Mr. Linegar,  
spoke of the terrible conditions exist-  
ing not only in St. John's but through-  
out the country. In referring to the  
so much talked of Humber Deal, Mr.  
English urged upon his hearers the  
necessity of looking the issue straight  
in the face. It was the first time  
in many years that there was a real  
issue before the people and the fate  
of the country depended upon how  
they were going to vote. They have  
refused to lay bare the Humber Deal  
and take the people into their confi-  
dence, because there is something  
deep and dark behind it all, and be-  
cause Coaker and Squires refuse to  
take the people into their confidence.  
They tell you in one breath that they  
have entered into a contract and the  
Mail and Advocate tells you in the  
next that no contract has been signed  
yet. He believed with Governor Har-  
ris that there was a big swindle be-  
hind it all. In conclusion Mr. Eng-  
lish urged upon all to vote for the  
Bennett candidates, men who will put  
the deal before the people and if it  
was a good deal would put it through  
for the people.

THE MENACE OF COAKERISM.  
Mr. Hunt spoke on the menace of  
Coakerism, that has been killing St.  
John's since Coaker and Squires took  
charge of the Government of this Is-  
land home of ours. Government un-  
der Coaker control means that Coak-  
er can put the Government out of  
business just when he pleased. Coak-  
er and Squires have already driven  
10,000 of our young manhood out of  
the country, and thousands of others  
would have to go if they were again  
returned. The challenge to explain  
the Humber Deal has not been an-  
swered yet and is not likely to be. It  
was an insult to the people in which  
Campbell and Coaker are asking the  
people to swallow this bait. Mr. Hunt  
asked for the straight ticket, no  
"Splits" are wanted in St. John's  
West, but the whole three CASHIN,  
LINEGAR and HUNT.

SIR MICHAEL CASHIN TELLS OF  
TERRIBLE CONDITIONS IN  
THE CITY.

Sir M. P. Cashin told of the won-  
derful reception received during their  
house to house canvass yesterday,  
when over 200 homes were visited.  
They were received with open arms  
everywhere. Sir Michael was sorry for  
the many sad cases of destitution  
that he and his colleagues had met  
due to unemployment. It was a ter-  
rible story. Conditions are worse in

the city than any place in the coun-  
try. How can those conditions be  
bettered, when Squires and Coaker  
have bungled everything that they  
took on, and not one benefit has ac-  
rued to Newfoundland. The people  
are given the rock sheds, it can't go  
on, its got to stop, they must be  
brought back to normal. He was glad  
it was Coaker's fault and not his.  
What struck Sir Michael was the great  
patience of the people under such  
trying circumstances. Women and  
children to-day in this city are with-  
out sufficient food to keep their body  
and souls together, and the man who  
would go around this city and see  
conditions as they are and then vote  
for Squires should hang his head in  
shame. He was glad that he took it  
upon himself to visit every home in  
St. John's West, as he will then have  
personal information of conditions as  
they really are. Hundreds at the  
present are destitute, suffering through  
the mad tactics of Coaker, who  
through his fish regulations lost mil-  
lions of dollars for Newfoundland. Lost  
our fish markets, and put us back  
for years. It was caused by the  
millions that were squandered by  
Squires by increased taxation and by  
the millions that the Railway has cost  
this country since Squires and Coaker  
took over the reins of power. They  
have driven us to desperation and lit-  
tle children and women are to-day  
the sufferers, while the broad winner  
is almost frantic in his endeavour to  
provide for his wife and little ones.  
Sir Michael said that indications were  
that a brighter day was dawning.  
From all over the country the cry  
for clean Government and better  
times was being heard and the coun-  
try as a united body were going to  
drive the present bunch of misfits in-  
to political oblivion.

The story told by Sir Michael creat-  
ed a deep impression on all his hear-  
ers.  
Mr. J. T. Martin in a few words  
said that every word spoken by Mr.  
Linegar and Sir Michael Cashin was  
only too true. He impressed upon  
all present to make sure that they  
had been registered as the Court of  
Revision closes to-day.  
The forces of the Liberal-Labour  
candidates in St. John's West are in-  
creasing daily, and it is now gener-  
ally conceded that CASHIN, LINEGAR  
and HUNT will establish a record in  
this loyal old district.

### Obituary.

MR. MICHAEL J. RYAN DEAD AT  
BONAVISTA.

Mr. E. J. Ryan, who is now in the  
city, received a telegram on Thurs-  
day from his brother Nicholas at  
Bonavista, informing him that his  
brother, Mr. Ryan, had passed peace-  
fully away that evening, Thursday,  
the 5th. Deceased was the fourth  
son of the late Mr. Michael Ryan and  
brother of Hon. D. A. Ryan, Messrs.  
Nicholas, Edward, Patrick, John and  
the late Hon. James Ryan. He was  
in his 68th year and was born in  
Bonavista, receiving his education  
there in the Parochial School. After  
leaving school he worked with the  
firm of James Ryan & Co. where he  
continued till about four years ago  
when he retired owing to ill-health.  
He came to St. John's about two  
years ago and spent a year in the  
Hospital, where he underwent sev-  
eral operations for internal trouble.  
He recovered his health to some ex-  
tent and was able to return home  
about 18 months ago. About Christmas  
of last year he became ill again and  
grew gradually worse. He took to his  
bed in March and grew weaker day  
by day till the end came. He lived at the  
old homestead at "Cove," which he in-  
herited from his father. Deceased was  
unmarried. He was a very intelligent  
man and inherited the keen business  
ability of the family. The funeral took  
place to-day at Bonavista. Mr. E. J.  
Ryan knowing that his brother's  
death was not far off made several  
attempts to get to Bonavista. He  
chartered the tug Hugh D. on Wed-  
nesday. They got half way across  
Conception Bay when the pumps got  
choked. As the ship began to leak the  
captain would not risk going on and  
they had to return. The Telegram ex-  
tends its sympathy to the relatives of  
the deceased in their sad bereavement.
