Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.

The regular meeting of the City
Council was held yesterday afternoon.
Mayor Cook presided and Councillors
Martin, Outebridge, Collier, Ryan and
Dowden were present.

After the Minutes of last meeting
were read and confirmed, the following
matters received attention:

Mr. B. Colton, on behalf of the St.
Mary's Parish Building Committee,
asked permission to use land in front
of the present Parish Hall, Southside
Road, for storage of materials to be
used in the construction of a new hall
which is soon to be commenced. The
request was granted subject to the
approval of the City Engineer, who
will give the location, etc.

Mr. C. J. Dutoit, on behalf of the
Methodist Guards' Band requested
permission to hold concerts in Ban-
nerman and Victoria Parks, during
the coming season. They are to be
given permission on the same con-
ditions as last year, and arrange-
ments are to be made by the City
Clerk.

A. E. Hickman & Company, Ltd.,
asked that an opportunity be given
them of tendering for the supply of
road oil. An order for this year's re-
quirements has been placed. The
sample submitted by this company,
which was tried out last year, will be
reported on by the City Engineer in
the course of a few days and his find-
ings will be forwarded them.

The following matters were referred
to the City Engineer:

(1) Protest received from Mr. J.
Burke against hopper being placed
in front of his residence, Lime Street;
(2) Communication from R. Dwyer,
Oak Farm, re the need of repairs be-
ing made to Dwyer's Bridge, and also
calling attention to the dangerous con-
dition of fence near the embankment
at this place; (3) complaint of J. T.
Butler as to the condition of side-
walk, Gear Street.

C. J. Winsor forwarded protest
against the erection of Butterline Fac-
tory, LeMarchant Road, which he
stated would seriously depreciate his
property. He stated that he had been
requested by many residents of Le-
Marchant Road, East and West, to
submit to the Council a petition which
they would be willing to sign. As
permission was granted for this erec-
tion several days ago, the protest can-
not be given consideration.

In the matter of land, north of
Macklin Place (off Leslie Street), be-
longing to Mr. Jas. Ellis, which was
the subject of considerable discussion
at previous meetings, Mr. Ellis wrote,
stating he wished to make his position
quite clear and therefore submitted
the deeds to the property. These
will be enquired into by the City En-
gineer.

The Committee appointed with the
City Engineer to visit LeMarchant
Road and consider what could be
done as regards the sidewalk, report-
ed that, in order to satisfy the many
complaints received, it would be nec-
essary to place a concrete curb and
gutter along both sides of this thor-
oughfare from Parade to Pleasant St.
The Engineer submitted an estimate.
Cost of the work, as follows: Laying
concrete curb and gutter on both sides
of Road, \$9,100.00; Sidewalks of Tar,
\$9,100.00; total \$18,200.00. As the
Council is unable to undertake such a
large expenditure, consideration was
deferred.

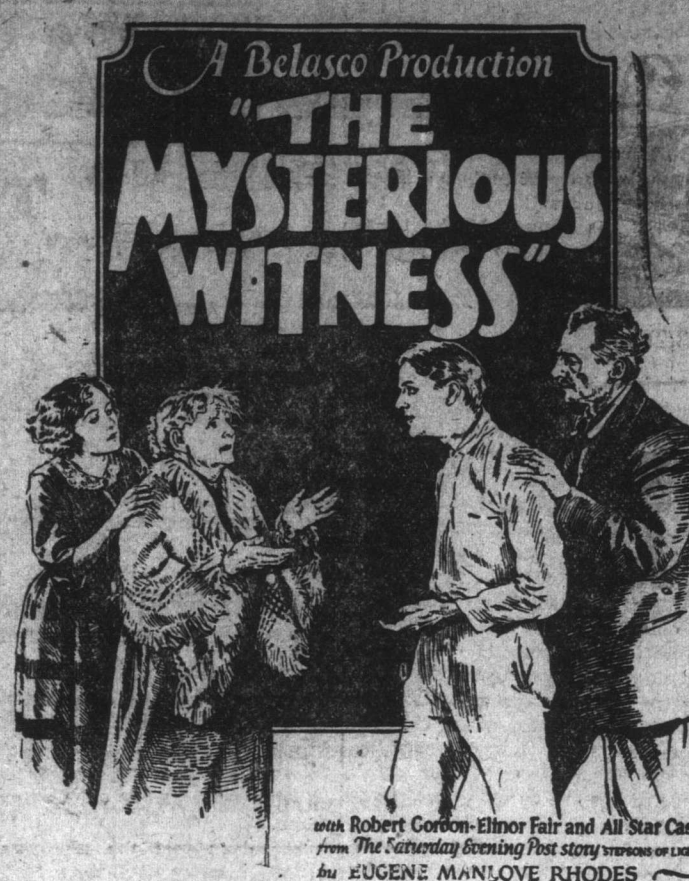
Contract for the supply of uniforms

essary plumbing work at the Bun-
galow, Bowring Park, was awarded
J. H. Lakin.

PLANS

The following were passed subject
to the approval of the City Engineer
at whose office building permits may
be obtained on application:—Extens-
ions, Mrs. Rodgers, Hamilton Avenue;
D. Whittle, corner Alexander and Wa-
ter Streets; E. Evans, Cookstown Rd.;
L. French, Field Street; Dwellings,
P. Kennedy, McKay Street, provided
he submit proper plan, showing lo-
cation to the City Engineer, and also
that he undertakes to pay proportion
of cost for water and sewerage exten-
sion; Garages, O. E. Brown, Merry-
meeting Road, and F. Lewis, Battery
Road conditional ventilators being in-
stalled.

A Resolution of Condolence was
passed and ordered forwarded to Hon.
P. J. Morris, K.C., who for many years
was legal adviser of the Council, in
his recent bereavement.

The Medical Officer of Health re-
ported that during the week the City
has been free from infectious disease.
Reports of the City Engineer, Sani-
tary Supervisor etc. for the week,
were tabled and discussed.
Regulations for various depart-
ments were granted, and with the
passing of accounts, the meeting ad-
journed.
