The influence of 'the Gulf Stream is missing in the south. There are no warm currents beyond 55 degrees of south latitude.

The territorial value of the Antaractic is confined to a littoral base for the purpose of whale fishing but the Canadian Arctic has mineral and food possibilities of reported great but unascertained values while valuable
