Can't Buy Pistols In B. C.

Victoria, April II.—In order that no ne on Vancouver island—arms deales or others—may unwittingly get to trouble through ignorance of the aw provincial law, or misappreheno in that it is not yet in force, it may pointed out that unless possessed of certificate issued under the prosions of the criminal code, or a perit secured from the superintendent resome chief of police, no person in ritish Columbia may now legally irchase a revolver, pistol, air gun or ich weapons as bowie knives, dagers, stilettoes, metal knuckles or sling tots; and dealers who sell such eapons without the exhibition of the cessary permit by the purchaser are the to fines of from \$25 to \$200 and a months' imprisonment. Such is no of the effects of the act respecting to sale of offensive weapons passed the last session of the legislature. This statute also provides that every roon selling a revolver, pistol, air m or similar weapon, must keep a cord of the date of the sale, name the maker, serial number of the apon and name, address and occuation of the purchaser. Police officers under the new act may search any person whom they may suspect of illegally carrying weapons, and if anyone, not a native of Canada, is found in possession thereof, the matter must immediately be reported to the attorney general, who may recommend to the minister of justice that the person in question may be forthwith deported.

German Aviator Is Killed
