So Said Ballot Box Jury at Belleville on Saturd y.

Belleville, March 20 .- The trial of Belleville, March 20.—The trial of Ed. G. Ruttan for conspiracy in connection with bogus ballot boxes went on Saturday. Pretty much the same evidence as that given at the preliminary investigation was presented, but a few new points came out.

Albion Hotel, Kingston, testified that certain boxes addressed to one Kerfoot had come to his place last October, and had been taken away by Ruttan, who had told him the boxes were expected before they came.

Layton Guess, liveryman, of King-ston, swore to driving Ruttan and some boxes of literature from the Al-bion Hotel to Shibley's house at Har-



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
