Local Market.

Reported by A. M. Hamilton & Son. We had a real old time market today. There was lots of stuff and lots of people to buy it. Some difficulty was experienced in finding buyers for hay, potatoes and beef, but this is not to be wondered at an these lines have for not to be wondered at as these lines have for some months been much higher than are other markets near by. Sellers found it necessiry to reduce the price, and when that was done the movement became general, and at going to press nearly everything of anything like good quality had found purchasers. Wheat came forward freely; the quality of offering was much quality had found purchasers. Wheat came forward freely; the quality of offering was much improved. Buying was general. The wheat market was quite a satisfaction to both the selling and buying side. London today, for the first time, gave some thing like the volume the prices paid for the last month deserve. Wheat values were: Hard red, such as Manchester, Golden Cross, Scott and Mediterranean soid at 85c to 81c; soft wheats, Rogers and Clawson, sold at 83c to 85c; whites brought 87c to 91c. Over 90c was seldom paid, and only for extra clean, pure, hright samples. Oats opened strong at 82c to 84c, with a strong preference for white. Lower advices from outside made millers and shippers hold off early, as they found at those figures they could not realize profits. Roceipts increased considerably towards 9:30 a'clock, and a sharp break of 2c occurred in the general market. break of 2c occurred in the general market.
Of course some loads sold at the old price to break of 2c occurred in the general market. Of course some loads sold at the old price to private parties, and in cases where buyers were running each other, but the bulk and main sales were at the close being made at 80c and 82c, with whites still loading. Barley receipts were heavier, but did not increase in proportion with other stuff. A few loads were sold somewhere between 80c and 85c, both the buyers and sellers not being inclined to state the actual price. We heard 80c and 81c bid for feeding and 85c for malting samples. Peas steady at 80c to 85c for ordinary stock; 87c to 90c was paid for sound lines, no rye offered. Corn quotatins are about a week old. American corn is about 5c a bu lower since last sales here; it is likely this will effect future sales. Beans were offered in private deals and bids of 10c made; one lot sold at that price in the open market. Eggs still continue to climb the ladder, and today's sales show an exceedingly strong feeling; large lots sold at 14c to 16c per dozen, according to the quantity; retail sales were made at 18c to 10c. Butter was steady and if anything day's sales show an exceedingly strong feeling; large lots sold at 14c to 16c per dozen, according to the quantity; retail sales were made at 16c to 19c. Butter was steady and if anything a little easier; crocks, 29c to 22c; peund rolls, 22c to 24c. Chickens, ducks and geese contributed a good share of today's receipts. The prices were about the same as on Thursday. There was a bountiful supply of meat, and much better sales, as far as the volume is concerned, but not quite so good whon prices are considered. The general price of beef was 50 by the carcass, but some sold at 4½c, and the quality was almost equal to the best. Veal and lamb unchanged. Dressed hogs firm at \$6 to \$6 75. Trade in hides and skins steady; sales at 1c, 2c and 3c, according to quality. Grapes were easier, selling at 2c for Worden and Concord; 25c and 3c for Niagara and Catawbs. Peaches were steady at 45c to 70c. None of the really choice lots of extras reached the market. The supply was considerably heavier. There was a good inquiry and the stuff went off pretty well Apples steady and unchanged. Fall sold at 30c to 50c per bag; winters, \$1 to \$150 per barrel. All the vegetable list was unchanged, with the exception of potatoes. Early sales of them were made at 70c to 75c. Receipts were too heavy for consumption, and at going to press many lots had not found purchasers and prices had reduced about 10c ber bag, closing at 69c to 70c per bag. Tomatoes were a shade up at 30c to 40c. Hay opened at \$9, but before 0 a, m. the receipts came down in the market from all quarters, and there was a regular deluge of it.
