CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING.

A Londoner Arrested at Detroit—Two Prominent Young Men.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 22.—Two prominent young men of Windsor and St. Thomas respectively were arrested on Saturday charged with smuggling. They were arrested yesterday with \$30 worth of silks in their possession, which they a short time before their arrest had brought from Windsor. One is Walter C. Leary, aged 27, junior member of the firm of Leary & Bros., prominent drygoods merchants of Windsor. The second is Harry L. Drake, of St. Thomas, aged 25, and brother of the wife of A. D. Leary. He came to Windsor a few days ago to visit his sister. When first questioned by the detectives the accused said some unknown man had paid them a few dollars to bring the goods across and leave them at the hotel where they were arrested. The police gave slight credence to this story. A. D. Leary, brother of one of the young men, and senior member of the firm, was dumb-founded when he learned of the trouble his brother had become implicated in, and was sure there was a mistake. The reputation of both partners has been above reproach, and the credit of the firm is said to stand high. The brothers are sons of Rev. John Leary, formerly pastor of the Windsor Avenue Methodist Church, later of Sarnia, and now of St. Mary's.

William McDonough, aged 27, son of Rev. Wm. McDonough, of Kingsville, formerly of London and Exeter, was arrested on the same charge, but it was shown that he was only in company with the others and was not connected with the smuggling. The two young men were released on \$200 bail. Drake has been residing in London recently, and was on a visit to his sister, Mrs. Leary, when the affair happened.

Five Members Carried Down With Their Home—Their Bodies Recovered.

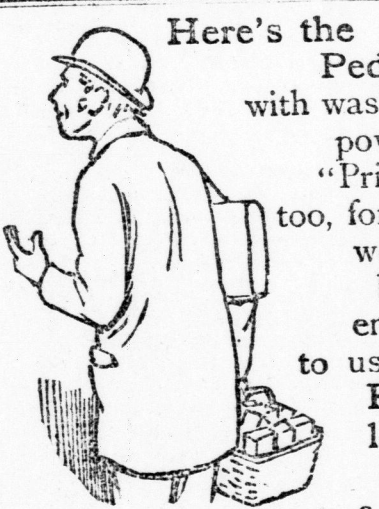

The river is completely blocked, and other landslides and an inundation are feared.
