

Stuffed Calf's Heart-If people only knew how delicious a calf's heart is, it would be more popular, and the butchers would ask more than 10 cents delicacy. Make stuffing as for a turker with teaspoon butter quarter-teaspoonound, 58-80; Toronto, 58-84; Ottawa, with a pinch of sage or thyme. Fill 8-86; Montreal, 64-84; Quebec, 60-80; the cavity full, tie a buttered paper over end to keep in place. Bake for one hour, basting often. Thicken the gravy with browned flour. Garnish the dish with spring onions size silver dollar, boiled almost done, then put in pan with the heart to finish cooking

and brown slightly. Rice with Tomato Sauce-Threequarters of a cup of rice cooked in milk boiler; do not stir. When done, while yet hot, mold into cones by put-
