The value of the real estate mortgaged is \$115,800,000, compared with \$110,-916,000 in 1893, an increase of \$4,900,000. In total loans the amount returned is \$121.-600,000, compared with \$115,346,000 in 1893, an increase in the year of \$600,000. 000.
