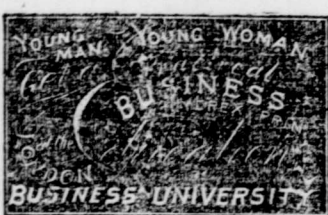

A BIG HARVEST OF PEARLS.
The whole coast of the Gulf of California abounds in pearls, and last year \$250,000 worth was harvested in Lower California alone. Pearl fishing is the entire occupation of the natives, and La Paz, the headquarters, a city of the peninsula, with about 2,000 inhabitants, is solely dependent upon the industry. Every oyster does not contain its pearl, and only at intervals is a really valuable pearl thus discovered. The largest one ever found was about three-quarters of an inch in diameter, and was sold in Paris for the sum of Austria for \$10,000. Many black pearls are found in Lower California, and are valued higher than the pure white.

In the Dining-Room.

• BREAKFAST—Fricassee of brains.
• Fried potatoes, Green, corn, Griddle cakes. Bread, Tea or coffee.
• LUNCHEON—Sliced cold meat, small salad, small bread and butter cakes. Tea, hot or iced.
• DINNER—Breaded lamb chops, Corn chowder, Cucumber salad, Stuffed tomatoes, New potatoes, roasted, Lima beans, Fruit.

• Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Green Corn Griddle Cakes—Run a knife through the center of the grains, then with the knife scrape out all you can. (If you have a corn grater so much the better. To twelve ears add the yolks of two eggs, a level teaspoon of salt, one tablespoon of melted butter (no flour). Beat the whites very light, add one or two more whites if you have them. Beat six eggs thoroughly with butter; mix a little of the white with the batter each time you add the griddle drop in small tea-spoons, and cook on a hot griddle. —large ones will not turn. When they look dry around the edge turn with a broad knife. They are very delicate.

Small Almond Cakes—Chop half a pound of citron and mix with it three-quarters of a pound of shelled almonds which have been blanched and sliced into halves. Beat six eggs thoroughly and cream into them three-quarters of a pound of sugar. Add the nuts and citron, and after thoroughly mixing sift gradually into the mixture half a pound of flour and one spoonful of baking powder. Pour the batter into long shallow tins, which have been well buttered. When done roll in powdered almonds and sugar. Packed carefully in tin, these cakes will keep moist indefinitely.

Corn Chowder—Remove the husks and silk from six large ears of corn scrape down through the middle of the rows of grain and scrape out the interior with the back of a knife. Peel and slice one onion, add one pint of potatoes, sliced, and cut in dice a quarter-pound of salt pork. Fry pork and onions in a sauce-pan; take them out with a skimmer, and put the other ingredients into the drippings in layers, seasoning them palatably with about one saltspoon of salt and cook the chowder gently for half an hour after it begins to boil. Just before the chowder is done scald one pint of milk and pour it over one and one-half pounds of milk or Boston crackers, laid in a soup tureen. Cover the tureen for five minutes; then see that the chowder is properly seasoned; pour it into the tureen, and serve it with a plate of crackers.

Breaded Lamb Chops—One pound and a half of lamb chops, two eggs beaten. Dip in chops, sprinkle with salt, and pepper and roll in bread crumbs. Fry in hot fat. Cook five minutes in a little water (about half a pint), strain and season with one large saltspoonful of salt, and four dashes of pepper. Put the chops or platter and pour over the dressing.

Cucumber Salad—Cut the cucumbers in thin slices and soak in cold water for one hour; two good-sized ones will do. Cut some cold, well-salted pota-

The Court Unwilling to Interfere Between Husband and Wife.

Recommendation of Reconciliation Advanced by the Magistrate—Barber Finch's Charge Modified and Sentence Suspended.

Malcolm Meston, whose matrimonial life has not been a continual path of roses, was again before Magistrate Parke this morning. Two weeks ago Mrs. Meston had her husband up for non-support, but the circumstances were of such a nature that the magistrate adjourned the case in the hope of a settlement. Mr. Meston has bought a house, and Mrs. Meston won't live in it, and sues her husband to pay her rent for another house, which he declines to do. She also says she is afraid to live with him, on account of his conduct. This Meston denies, and the magistrate again urged a settlement.

Mr. McEvoy, Mrs. Meston's solicitor, stated that all had been done that possibly could be done to arrange the matter amicably, but without success. If the man caused a woman she should not be compelled to live with him, and Meston should support her. "Are we never to forgive anything?" asked the magistrate, with a sympathetic smile. "She should forgive him, and try to get along."

"Forgive everything, your worship," said Mr. McEvoy, "forgive and forget, too, I suppose?"

Further remonstrance by the court was futile, and the magistrate decided the case to be one in which he could not interfere and dismissed it. Semi-Conscious When Found.

William West Injured in an Unknown Manner.

Could Give No Account of Himself—Taken to the Hospital—A Stranger in the City.

A man was found in a semi-conscious condition near the C. P. R. station about 10:30 last night. He was unable to give any account of himself, and moved about in a dazed manner, which attracted the attention of a citizen, who thought the man was insane, and notified P. C. Toohy.

The officer found the unfortunate fellow sitting on the embankment at the rear of the station. He tapped him on the shoulder, and ordered him to come along, but the stranger could neither speak nor help himself. Think that he had been hurt by a train in some way, Toohy carried him into the depot, but could find no signs of injuries, so he called the patrol, and had him removed to the police station. On arriving there the man was still in an unconscious condition, and he was sent to the City Hospital.

The stranger is about 30 years of age, clean, and fairly well dressed. Nothing whatever was found on him which would lead to his identity, a card bearing the name of a Toronto hotel and a watch being the only articles in his pockets. He said this morning that his name was Wm. West, but he was not sufficiently conscious to give any particulars as to the cause of his present condition.
