#### SCHOOL OF METHODS

For the Counties of Middlesex and Oxford.

Under the Auspices of the W. C. T. U.

At Tilsonburg yesterday the W. C. T. U. held "A School of Methods" for the counties of Oxford and Middlesex. The representation was large, the Baptist Church being well filled with delegates. The convention opened at 10 a.m. with Mrs. Calvert, of the Middlesex Union, in the chair. After devotional exercises, Mrs. Calvert spoke of the importance of the work of the School of Methods.

"Temperance in Sunday Schools," was the subject of a very suggestive paper by Mrs. Heaman, of this city, which was followed by a thoughtful discussion, participated in by quite a number of members.

The subject of "Organization" called out reports relative to the difficulties in the way of the success of work by the local unions.

Mrs. (Dr.) Ryce read a very valuable paper on "Scientific Temperance in Schools," prepared by Mrs. McLeod, of Woodstock.

After a brief discussion of the topic, Miss Jacobs, of Norwich, conducted the question box. The noontide prayer was conducted by Mrs. Bowman, of Norwich.

The afternoon session began with devotional exercises, conducted by Mr. Dickenson, of Woodstock, with Mrs. B. D. Livingston, president of Oxford Union, in the chair. Mrs. May Thornley, of London, spoke very fully on "Department Help," naming the most valuable literature of the various places of the W. C. T. U. work.

"Fair Work," a paper by Mrs. Ballantyne (Strathroy), describing practical and successful experiences in that line, was followed by a paper by Miss Cosford (London) on "Duties of Recording Secretary."

"Our Work and Womanliness" was the theme of a paper of rare literary excellence by Miss Ethelwyn Wetherald, associate editor of Wives and Daughters.

"Social Purity Work" was discussed in admirable tone and language by Miss Polson, of Norwich.

"Parliamentary Practice" was a strong plea by Mrs. Thornley, of London, in favor of conducting W. C. T. U. meetings after approved methods in order to economize time and avoid many annoyances which prejudicially affect the meetings of unions. Mrs. Thornley conducted a practical drill in parliamentary practice.

The question box was conducted by Mrs. Thornley, her answers being full of valuable information and suggestions. The session was concluded with words of appreciation of the value of the exercises of the "School of Methods" by Mrs. Livingston.

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## Late Canadian News

Another Rich Oil Strike in Petrolia.

Petrolia now boasts of 5,000 inhabitants. The ice bridge at the falls has disappeared.

The Petrolia oil market at present is generally dull.

A 3-year-old son of A. McGee, who lives near Stirling, was burned to death Thursday by standing near the stove.

Before J. R. Arnold went to jail Thursday he visited his wife. The parting is reported to have been very affecting.

A bill extending the franchise to women has been introduced in the Nova Scotia Legislature by Mr. Hemon, of Queen's.

Mr. John H. Carter, of Toronto, supreme grand secretary of the Sons of England, has been created a past supreme grand president.

Some time Thursday night the sporting store of H. P. Davies & Co., 81 Yonge street, Toronto, was robbed of about \$1,000 worth of goods.

Thursday morning, near Jerseyville, Mr. John Dadds was killed by a falling tree. Deceased was about 30 years of age, and leaves a wife and five small children.

John Vanshline, aged 30, a carter at the G. R. freight shed in Nanawake, while loading a piano slipped, letting it fall on him, crushing him to death. He leaves a wife and four small children.

Melvin Long, of Nelson township, has begun proceedings against Fulford & Co., Brockville, claiming \$5,000 damages for advertising plaintiff as the "Haltom miracle," cured of rheumatism by "pink pills."

The Petrolia Town Council voted that the petition received from the Dominion Alliance be adopted, and that the mayor be instructed to sign the same on behalf of the council for presentation to the Ontario Legislature.

In the arbitration of the Dominion, Ontario and Quebec, at a meeting of the arbitrators today, Chancellor Boyd was appointed chairman, Mr. Audet secretary, and Mr. Butcher stenographer. April 18 was appointed the day for argument to begin.

#### PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION

Why should not Toronto have five members in the Local Legislature, returned on that system of proportional representation known as cumulative voting? The unit of representation in the Provincial House is about 21,000 of population, which means probably 4,000 or 5,000 voters. If the grand old principle of representation by population is to prevail, Toronto is entitled to even more than five members. So that in asking for five we are well within our rights.

In selecting these members under the cumulative system
