BRUTAL NURSES.

New York, Dec. 21.—As a result of the investigation conducted by Charities Commissioner John W. Keller into the matter of abuses in the insane and alcoholic pavilions in the Bellevue Hospital, Commissioner Kellar today expressed great indignation at the conditions discovered. Yesterday he sent out members of his department to obtain evidence, and today the commissioner said: The nature of the evidence brought to me discloses in the alcoholic ward and the insane pavilion a brutality that is shocking; utter disregard for feelings; rough usages; abusive language to the inmates; negligence in nursing and extreme physical violence."

Signs Are Perceptible in Districts Imme diately South of Orange River.

The Government of New Zealand Will Send Another Contingent to South Africa --- Dewet Has 6,000 Men and 18,000 Horses.

DEARTH OF NEWS. London, Dec. 21 .- Since Lord Kitchener's dispatch fully confirming the invasion of Cape Colony, and expressing a hope, not of capture, but only to "drive them north again," not a word has been issued officially as to the sit-

uation in South Africa. Considerable activity is now manifested at Aldershot. A large draft of mounted troops will be ready to start for South Africa, Jan. 6, while others have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for the same destination.

According to the Cape Town carrespondent of the Daily Mail, the treason court sitting in Colesberg was obliged hurriedly to remove to Cape Town with the records and documents owing to the vicinity of the invading Boers. ANTI-BRITISH EXCITEMENT.

"The Colesberg district," says the correspondent, "is seething with anti-British excitement. A recrudescence of rebellion is perceptible in the districts immediately south of the Orange River. Tuesday morning a fight was proceeding at Philipstown, presumably with a commando which crossed at Sand Drift."

Cape Town, Dec. 20 .- Martial law has been proclaimed in the following additional districts: Britstown, Victoria West, Richmond, Hanover, Murraysburg, Graaf Reinet, Aberdeen, Middleburg, Steynsburg, Cradock, Tarka and Molteno.

DEWET'S TERMS.

London, Dec. 21. - A dispatch from Bloemfontein, dated Tuesday, Dec. 18. says: Gen. Dewet had 6,000 men and 18,000 horses when he captured Dewetsdorp, according to a gentleman who was imprisoned there. The Boer commander then declared that he was not going to surrender without a free pardon for all his men, including many Cape Dutch. The force of 6,000 is now divided into three sec-

tions.

ROLLED THIRTEEN MILES. Kingston, Ont., Dec. 21.-The first information touching the nature of the wound received by Sergt. Fred Metcalife, Royal Canadian Dragoons, has just come to hand. The engagement took place on Nov. 6, four Canadians, including Corp. Filson, being killed, and 14 wounded. The story of the bravery of the small band of Can-adians is told by Trooper Chas. Mcson of John McKay, this city. Metcalfe and his comrades made a most magnificent fight, refusing surrender, though repatedly called upon by the Boers to do so. Finally, however, they were overwhelmed by superior force of numbers, but only

then when their ammunation had become totally exhausted. The Boers took Metcalfe's rifle and side arms, and wented to take his watch and valuables, but these he absolutely refused to give up, saying they would first have to kill him. Though wounded by a bullet in the hip and unable to walk, Metcalfe managed to escape, and by crawling on his hands and knees, and rolling over and over, he managed to cover the thirteen miles separating him from Gen. Smith-Dorrien's column,

PTE. MULLOY'S PENSION. Ottawa, Dec. 21.—The imperial pension of two shillings and sixpence a day that has been granted to Pte. Mulloy, of Winchester, who lost his eyesight from a Boer bullet, amounts, in Canadian currency, to 60 cents a day, and, with the per diem allowance of \$1, which, it is said, will be made to him from the patriotic fund, the blind veteran will be able to maintain himself for the present at least in fairly comfortable circumstances. Private Mulloy, according to rumor, will resume his studies for the ministry, which he temporarily abandoned when he enlisted as a soldier of the Queen. The war office has not as yet communicated to the authorities here its intention with respect to the claims of other disabled Canadians upon its generosity, and the inference is that Private Mulloy was singled out for early recognition because of the sympathetic consideration he received from the English public while in England.

PROMOTED. Windsor, Dec. 21.—Lieut. Mortimer Wigle, of Kingsville, writing from South Africa, says that Major Arthur H. King has been promoted to be squadron leader. The writer gives a vivid account of a raid upon a Boer laager on Nov. 3. a night, a cold rain was falling, and the men were nearly frozen. ## CONTRARY TO AGREEMENT.

Germans Shoot Soldiers Who Are Suppressing Boxers.

Kaiser's Troops Gaining Werse Reputation Than the Russians Ever Had.

London, Dec. 21.-A dispatch to the Morning Post from Pekin says it is reported that German troops visited Lung Ching last Saturday and shot 60 imperial soldiers who were engaged in suppressing the Boxers at that place. They also shot 30 other persons, and took 200 prisoners. It is also said that the Germans looted many houses and shops. The expedition was contrary to the understanding that no measures of the kind were to be taken, pending the negotiations. Much of the country is defenseless, because the Chinese troops are not allowed to do anything. The

foreign troops are absent or engaged in looting.

Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee has failed to secure accord by a just and discriminating policy, and the Germans on many grounds are gaining a worse reputation for severity than even the Russians ever had.

BRITISH CONTROL OF RAILWAY. Lord Lansdowne has concluded negotiations, according to the Daily Mail, by which Russia, on Jan. 1, will give Great Britain entire control of the railway from Pekin to Shan Hai Kwan.

ALL SIGNED THE NOTE.

Berlin, Dec. 20.-The Cologne Gazette announces that all the ministers signed the preliminary joint note Thursday. It also declares that the note embodies the principles of the minimum demands of Germany, and the powers, and that it was agreed, on the proposal of Great Britain, that until the demands were satisfied there should be no withdrawal of the troops from Pe-

kin and the Province of Chi Li. London, Dec. 21. - According to a dispatch to the Reuter Telegram Company, from Pekin, dated Dec. 20, the ministers have again decided upon the terms of the preliminary joint note. The dispatch says it is understood that they have adopted certain British amendments, which will require the approval of the various governments, and that probably some weeks will elapse before negotiations conclude. PERSECUTION STOPPED IN KO-

The Honan Refugee, a little sheet published at Che Foo by the Presbyterian missionaries from Honan, who have taken refuge there, states that word has been received by a messenger from Honan that the active persecution of the native Christians in the province ceased. So far no one connected with the Presbyterian mission is known to have been killed, though many have been tortured and beaten. In spite of

#### persecution, the converts have stood by their colors manfully.

OVER 1,000 ARTS MEN. Toronto, Dec. 21.-The enrolled attendance of art students this year at Toronto University and Victoria is 800, as compared with 725 last year. Trinity has 27 and McMaster 145, so that the total for the city is 1,032 art students. #### KILLED 13 REBELS

American Cavalry and Sailors Surprised and Routed Eighty Filipinos.

Washington, Dec. 21.-The following cablegram from Rear-Admiral Remey, giving an account of a sharp brush vith Filipino insurgents, was received today at the navy department: "Cavite, Dec. 20.—Fifteen troopers, of

the 4th Cavalry, and five of the crew ere landed from the gunboat Basco esterday at Limbanes, Cavite Provnce. They surprised 80 insurgents, and a sharp skirmish ensued, lasting half an hour. Thirteen insurgents were killed, 12 rifles captured, and a large amount of stores destroyed. One soldier was wounded. Remey."
