Quebec, Dec. 9.—The public testimonial to reward the bravery of Patrick Murphy, of this city, for his heroic services in saving 24 lives on as many separate occasions from watery graves was presented to Mr. Murphy yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Vanderbilt On the Shelf. New York, Dec. 9.—Cornelius Vanderbilt is ill from typhoid fever at his home here. He has been confined to his bed for a week, but the diagnosis has just been completed.

Coal for Toronto. Toronto, Dec. 9.—Since Saturday four boats have arrived with 2,721 tons of hard coal from Oswego. Two steamers and two schooners are at Oswego awaiting cargoes.

A Mere Rumor. Washington, Dec. 9.—The Russian ambassador, Count Cassini, authorizes an absolute denial of the report circulated from Vienna that a plot had been discovered to assassinate the Czar at Livadia.

Fainted in Witness Box. Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 9.—Fred C. Inwood, of Toronto, grand treasurer of the Ancient Order United Workmen, while testifying before Judge Meredith in a case against the order yesterday, fell out of the witness box on his face in an unconscious condition. His head was badly cut, and his condition is serious. This is the second occasion in which Mr. Inwood has been stricken in like manner.

Lived 15 Days With Bullet in His Brain. Detroit, Mich., Dec. 9.—After living since the night of Nov. 21 with a bullet lodged in his brain by a shot from his own hand, Francis Augustus Burrows, and came to this city to visit his brother. From remarks he made during his lucid intervals after the shooting, Burrows appears to have thought he was the victim of unrequited love.

ANGLO-CANADIAN TRADE GROWING

Returns for Eleven Months Show Big Increases.

COMPETITION IN CATTLE TRADE

Argentina a Strong Rival—A New Pulp Company—War on the Atlantic Fast Lane.

London, Dec. 9.—Anglo-Canadian trade continues to advance. The board of trade returns for eleven months, ending November, show the following increases in British imports from Canada: Cattle, £269,000; bacon, £269,000; hams, £112,000; butter, £308,000; cheese, £515,000; wheat, £228,000; wheat flour, £249,000; sawn wood, £314,000; horses, £7,000. Decreases—Sheep, £30,000; eggs, £1,000; oats, £163,000; peas, £18,000; maize, £250,000; hewn wood, £4,000. The imports of canned salmon totaled £104,000; canned lobsters, £153,000. The exports to Canada, which show increases, are: Salt, 27,000; spirits, £5,000; wool, £6,000; cotton piece goods, £157,000; jute piece goods, £13,000; linen piece goods, £8,000; silk, £8,000; woolen tissues, £103,000; worsted tissues, £88,000; carpets, £12,000; cutlery, £13,000; hardware, £8,000; pig iron, £91,000; bar iron, £50,000; sheets, boiler plates, £57,000; galvanized sheets, £75,000; tin plates, £79,000; cast wrought iron, £54,000; unwrought steel, £250,000; unwrought tin, £3,000; haberdashery, £39,000. Decreases—Cement, £19,000; earthenware, £5,000. The exports of apparel and shoes, waterproofs, totaled £28,000; not waterproofed, £200,000.

MUST FACE STRONG COMPETITION

It would seem, from Mr. Hanbury's speech at Chester on Saturday, that Canada must prepare to face the fullest competition of the Argentine Republic. Mr. Hanbury, who is now in London, announced that the Government of Argentina conceded everything he asked and has put Argentina under regulations identical with those of Canada, as to prevent the introduction of disease. Effect would be given to the regulations in a few days, with the result that Canada would lose every privilege that Canada enjoys in the matter of export of cattle to Great Britain.

The St. James' Gazette publishes an article on the subject of commercial Americanization of Canada. British exports to Canada, the writer says, have increased only 35 per cent in value during the past thirty-four years. Exports to the United States increased 362 per cent, and exports to other countries 241 per cent. "Until the Canadian Government amends its 'insolvency laws,' the article concludes, 'many British shippers will continue to be afraid of trading with Canada.'"

INCREASE IN C. P. R. WAGES

The city edition of the Westminster Gazette refuses to join the grumblings over the increased wages of the western section of the C. P. R. by \$50,000 yearly. The paper says: "A contented and zealous staff on the line is prepared to take full advantage of every kind of growing traffic, and in the country which is just through the cloak of its wealth, are bound in the end to give good, continuous dividends on all kinds of stock."

NEW PULP COMPANY

The prospectus is published of the British Canadian Pulp Company, capital \$500,000, formed to acquire a freehold near North Bay, Ont., and manufacture and sell pulp. A constituent is J. A. Ritchie, president of the Kinleith Paper Company, the vice-president Judge Macdonald, Toronto.

FAST MAIL CRUSADE

Lloyd's correspondent of the Times continues his crusade against the fast mail service. Commenting on the chart issued on behalf of Halifax as the terminal of the fast mail, he says: "The existence of such a service would be simply a matter of subsidies, and as regards these, agreement is freely expressed with the conclusions of the British shipping subsidies committee that subsidies ought to be stopped."

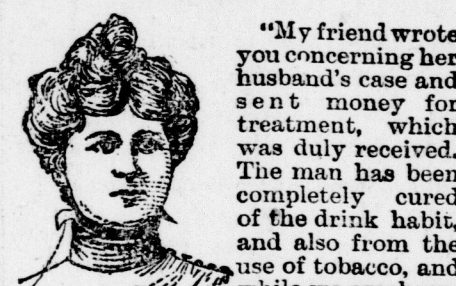

DOESN'T WANT IT. The Ottawa cablegrams repeat the rumor that Lord Milner may succeed Lord Minto next year. The previous idea here was that Lord Milner would be offered the succession to Lord Curzon of India, though the fact that Lord Milner is a bachelor would probably create greater difficulties in India than in Canada. An Ottawa correspondent says: "The popularity of Lord Minto is declining. He has recently been attempting to interfere too strongly in governmental affairs. The appointment of a new Governor-Generalship of Canada, would not accept, having declared that it is his desire to enjoy a few years of hard work in South Africa."

EMIGRATION TO CANADA. The emigration returns for November show that the following left British ports during that month for Canada: 1,000 men, 1,000 women, 1,000 children, 2,000. The total for the eleven months of the year is 63,724.

CABLE NOTES. The King of Portugal concluded on Monday morning a visit of three weeks to England and started homeward by way of Paris.

Prince Oscar, Emperor William's fifth son, has sustained a slight fracture of the collarbone through falling from a horizontal bar. The injury will not interfere with his studies.

Lady Dundonald is figuring in London society. She was present on Saturday at a party given by the Countess of Londonderry at the residence of Lady Adelaide Meade and Capt. Sydney Colville.

The strike crisis in Marseilles appears to be over. Many sailors and dockworkers have resumed work, and the unions have resumed an aspect of activity.

The all-Canadian football team will be cordially received on their arrival at Liverpool, where they will play their first match, and then visit Ireland, playing in Dublin and Belfast.

It is understood that Premier Borden has gone to a royal commission to inquire into the subject of municipal trading. The Government has long been desirous of grappling with this question, which admittedly raises an issue of the first importance.

NEARLY DEVoured BY SOW

Shocking Fate of Postmaster at Dayton.

The Man Was Lying Unconscious in a Fit When Attacked.

Thessalon, Dec. 8.—James Lovatt, postmaster at Dayton, met with a shocking fate Saturday, having been almost entirely eaten by a sow while in a fit. Deceased was subject to fainting spells, and while doing some chores about the yard was seized by one and fell in an unconscious condition to the ground. A sow which was running at large on the place at once commenced devouring the victim, and when the body was found it presented a most horrible spectacle. The flesh was gouged entirely from the face and head, and the breast was almost free of flesh, the stomach torn out and the arms and legs fearfully lacerated.

Owing to some domestic troubles the deceased's wife, with her two little daughters, left him a couple of weeks ago and went to reside with friends in Michigan, and at the time of his death there was no one about the premises. One of the neighbors' dogs was the first to view the sickening spectacle, when on coming to the house he viewed the mutilated remains of the old man and the ravenous brute feeding upon them.

The deceased was over 70 years of age, was married twice, and leaves a family of two daughters by his second marriage. The remains were interred in the Day Mills Cemetery on Tuesday afternoon.

The Guelph Fat Stock Show.

Guelph, Ont., Dec. 8.—The Provincial Fat Stock Show opened here this morning, and from the present indications will be larger than ever, the entries being largely in excess of former years. Today was taken up in placing exhibits, which have all to be in the building this evening, or will not be accepted.

Copper Smelter for Sudbury.

Toronto, Dec. 9.—Prof. W. G. Miller, Ontario Government geologist, has returned from his summer's work in Northern Ontario, and reports the greatest activity in exploration work. He says arrangements are soon to be made for a copper smelter at some point on the north shore of Lake Huron, in the Sudbury district.

BOSSSES GET THEIR "POUND OF FLESH"

Hardships of Miners' Widows and Orphans

AS TOLD TO THE COMMISSION

Light on the Powder Question—Price of Provisions Increased 30 Per Cent.

Scranton, Pa., Dec. 8.—Almost the entire time of the day's session of the commission was taken up by the miners in presenting their side of the controversy with G. B. Markle & Co. The miners placed witnesses on the stand whose testimony went to show that the company refused to employ them because they belonged to the union, and evicted them from their homes for the same cause; that the docking system was intolerable; that the question of the men getting the ten per cent increase in wages, granted as a result of the 1900 strike, is much in doubt; the price of powder, which enters into the computation of the increase, and the size of the mine have been increased, but the wages have not.

OPPRESSING THE WIDOW. Two Hungarian women told how the Markle Company deducted house rent from the last wages of their husbands, who were killed in the mines, and how the company attempted to get them to sign a paper which would absolve the Markles from damages for the death of the men. The women also confirmed the story told by the breaker, that the boy had to work without pay until the debt owed by the dead father was paid off.

The Markle Company were not represented by their own lawyers before the commission, although they had ample warning.

James Gallagher, an employee of G. B. Markle & Co., said it used to be the custom of the Markle employees to contribute wages to the family of a man killed in the mines and the man's fellow-workmen would lay off until the funeral. A compact was made later with the workmen, whereby the employers would pay the \$50 for the men to remain at work. Witness said the size of the mine cars had been steadily increased, but the wages paid had not been raised.

A FLURRY.

There was a flurry at the afternoon session because Lawyer Ira H. Burns, of Scranton, for the independent companies, referred to the President of the United States as "Teddy Roosevelt." The remark brought out an energetic objection from Brig.-Gen. Wilson and the general was sustained by Chairman Gray.

The commissioners today made an order request upon the companies to present figures as quickly as possible, and as a result the Erie Company late in the day submitted statistics regarding wages, hours and other data relative to the subject.

THE POWDER QUESTION.

The powder question came before the commission at the afternoon session and caused considerable discussion. It was brought about by Mr. Clark asking for the recall of Paul Dunlevy, a Markle miner, who had testified at the morning session. Mr. Clark read to the witness a statement of wages submitted to him in the forenoon, which showed that some months he owed the company \$4.50 for powder. Witness could not tell how it was that he was in debt and added that in his way of thinking the ten per cent increase in wages was not an increase at all. He explained that the company along with the other coal companies granted the men a reduction in the price of powder from \$2.15 and \$2.70 to \$1.50; but that the reduction in the powder was to be considered in the ten per cent increase in wages. In other words, they got a 2½-cent increase in wages and the powder reduction amounted to an increase in wages of 7½c for 10 per cent in all.

DEARER LIVING.

J. W. Rittenhouse, secretary of the Retail Grocers' Association, gave the prices for eggs, butter, meats and provisions for 1900, 1901 and 1902. The increase in prices ranged from 15 to 78 per cent, making the general average for groceries about 30 per cent higher than those of two years ago.

John B. Hughes, the Scranton manager for Armour & Co., gave the wholesale prices for all meats comparing them with the prices prevailing in 1900 and 1901. He showed that the prices of meats of all kinds have increased 2½ to 13 per cent over the prices of 1900.

BREAKER BOY'S WAGES.

Mrs. Andrew Chipp, the mother of the 12-year-old breaker boy, who testified on Saturday that he had to work out the debt of his dead father, took the stand and stated that she gave information through an interpreter, that the Markle Company wanted her to sign a paper waiving all rights to sue the company for the killing of her husband in the mines. The company promised her rent and coal free for six months, but she refused to sign. Upon her refusal to do so, they charged up rent and coal, and the little boy was compelled to work at 4 cents an hour in the breaker, but as his wages are so small, the debt is increasing.

SQUARING ACCOUNTS.

Another Hungarian woman, whose husband was killed at the same time and place as the breaker boy, told precisely the same story in every way. Her son was a driver boy in the mine at 8 cents a day and for five or six months received only five dollars, the remainder of his wages being retained by the company for rent and coal. Both women received \$50 each for burial expenses from the company, but the funeral expenses in each case were greater than \$50. When their husbands were killed the company took the money and gave it to them the house rent and coal bill.
