Toronto, Nov. 27. — Cornelius Shields, manager of the Lake Superior Consolidated Company, who has been for some months endeavoring to put through a plan of reorganization, held a conference with Premier Ross yesterday in company with H. C. Hamilton, barrister, of Sault Ste. Marie. It is understood that the subject of the conference was how the Government was to be protected in case of reorganization. The Government is liable to the banks for a quarter of a million dollars advanced for the payment of wages, and will naturally be a heavy creditor of the company.

KILLED HIS ARRESTER

Desperado Holds Town at Bay and Makes His Escape.

Fairmount, Ind., Nov. 27. — James Payne, town marshal, was shot and killed on the street yesterday afternoon by Harry Hooper, whom he had under arrest for burglary. Hooper also fired twice at Alonzo Bomas, who had started to assist the dying marshal as he lay on the street, but both shots missed. Hooper, after killing the marshal, moved slowly down, holding back the gathering crowd with his revolver and reaching the edge of town, started toward Van Buren, ordering no one to follow him under penalty of death. Stores were closed and armed business men pressed all available vehicles into service and started in pursuit of Hooper. Others have prepared for a lynching of Hooper should he be brought back.

CARSHOPS FOR ST. THOMAS

An Offer From Pere Marquette Which May Be Accepted.

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 26. — The ratepayers of St. Thomas will be given an opportunity on Jan. 4 next, of voting to bring the Pere Marquette Railway shops to St. Thomas. Last evening General Superintendent Woodlark of the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway, and W. M. Guy, local agent, completed an agreement with the city council which only lacks ratification by the ratepayers. The agreement entered into is to the effect that the Pere Marquette will erect its Canadian workshops here at an estimated cost of \$15,000, will install machinery therein at an outlay of \$50,000, and will employ not less than 100 hands. In return for this the city is to give the company a bonus of \$25,000, exemption from all taxes, excepting school taxes, for ten years, and will furnish water at manufacturers' rates or six cents per 100 cubic feet. Mr. Woodlark informed the aldermen that not less than 200 hands would be given steady employment. The first work to be done as soon as the shops are built will be the complete overhauling of 400 miles of road in Canada with 600 miles of road in Ontario. This will include the repairs to cars, engines and all other work necessary. The proposed shops will be erected within the city limits, near the present roundhouse. The date fixed for submitting the bylaw to the people is the same time as when the municipal elections are held. There is not the shadow of a doubt but that the bylaw will carry by an overwhelming majority. The agreement calls for work to be commenced at the erection of the shops six months after the passing of the bylaw, and to be completed within nine months from April 1, 1904.

MORE PATRIOTISM WAS URGED

By H. J. Pettypiece, M.P.P., in an Address Given at a Scottish Concert.

In the midst of an evening of everything Scotch, a keynote of Canadianism was struck at the concert in the First Congregational Church last night, by Mr. H. J. Pettypiece, M. P. for East Lambton. The speaker gave an excellent address, which was listened to by the large audience with the greatest pleasure. Mr. Pettypiece made a strong appeal for national spirit.

The programme in which this address was given followed another feature of the evening that was most enjoyable. This was the supper served by the Ladies' Aid of the church. Her clever readings were thoroughly appreciated, and in each stanza encouraged Mrs. Wheeler gave some Scotch songs in her delightful way, rendering "Blue Bells of Scotland" and "The Standard of the Braves of Mar."

HELPING "OLD JOE"

London, Nov. 27. — There has been a remarkable response to Mr. Chamberlain's appeal for funds to help the tariff reform campaign. Offers of donations ranging from 10s. to 100s. have been received. Many workmen are contributing small sums, and writing letters like this: "I am sending you a shilling to help Old Joe along."

Five poor clerks in Wandsworth sent a contribution of 10 shillings. "Under the guidance of our friend and champion, Mr. Chamberlain, we have no fear of the dear lost bogey."

WILD SCENES IN DIET

Members Have Epithets and Narrowly Escape Free Fight.

Budapest, Hungary, Nov. 26. — Scenes of indescribable confusion marked today's session of the Lower House of the Diet. They originated in the proposal to hold two sessions. The members of the extreme left vehemently protested, and several of them were suspended for disorderly conduct by the President, who was assisted by the President of the Diet, Count Tisza, atempted to speak. He called attention to the agreement between the different parties on rules of procedure. "You have put all the advantages of that agreement in your pocket," shouted Nicholas Bartha.

Deputy Gajary added to the disorder by jeeringly shouting to Count Tisza, "You have been called a scoundrel." Immediately there was a rush of deputies toward Gajary, causing a scene of wild tumult. As a free fight was threatened the sitting was suspended.

On the resumption of business Count Tisza appealed to the patriotism of the House, pointing out the dangers to the constitution from a policy of obstruction.

Later, when the President of the House mentioned recommending the notion in favor of two sessions, the disturbance broke out again and the House ultimately adjourned amid scenes of the greatest excitement.

MUNICIPAL TAXATION

The Principle of the Old Personality Upheld.

Toronto, Nov. 27. — More diverse views were presented at the meeting of the assessment committee of the City of Toronto yesterday—some favorable and some unfavorable. Frank McLean, K.C., of Hamilton, solicitor for the Ontario Municipal Association, upheld the principle of the old personality tax, and suggested the fixing of the furniture above \$1,000 instead of the proposed house tax. The secretary of the Manufacturers' Association, F. J. Young, strongly supported the bill on behalf of the single tax body communitives of that body. He commended several features of the bill and suggested an amendment exempting all houses up to \$100 from the real property tax. This was contended, and the committee will adjourn until next Wednesday.

NO ONE BLAMED

Jury's Verdict On Death of St. Thomas Fire.

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 27. — The coroner's jury to inquire into the cause of the death of Robt. H. Schwoob, M. C. R. fireman, who was killed at Altercliffe, on Nov. 17, after being out 26 minutes Wednesday night, returned a verdict to the effect "that the death of Robt. H. Schwoob, caused by the burning or blowing out of a fuse on engine No. 480, M. C. R., upon which he acted as fireman, and, from the evidence adduced, we are unable to find that the accident was due to any negligence on the part of the company or any of their employees."

LAKE TRAFFIC WAS GOOD

Season of 1903 a Highly-Profitable One.

Toronto, Nov. 27. — The navigation season of 1903 now about closing, has been one of the most profitable in many years to the owners of vessels, both in the passenger and freight business. In nearly every case the receipts in the passenger traffic have been larger than during the year of the Pan-American Exposition, at Buffalo, when the passenger traffic was unusually heavy. The freight traffic is always good between Hamilton, Toronto and Montreal, but this year it doubled between Toronto and Port Dalhousie and Toronto and Hamilton.

SLAIN BY WOLVES

The Fate of a Lumbering Plan in the Mattawa District.

Ottawa, Nov. 27. — Judging by a letter received in the city, F. X. Guertin, of Ottawa, a woodsman, who disappeared from a camp above Mattawa some weeks ago, has met a terrible death. The letter was received by P. Mullin from his brother-in-law, William Burns, who was employed in the same camp as Guertin. Burns and Guertin were members of a gang employed by Fraser & Co., to work in one of their camps during the winter. Guertin had strange hallucinations, and one night he left the camp presumably to return to his home in Ottawa. He was not seen afterwards, and as he did not arrive at his home, a search was made for him. Burns stated in the letter that in company with two Indians he searched the country about the camp for a couple of weeks, but no trace of Guertin could be had. The Indians, who were well acquainted with the country, expressed the belief that Guertin had been run down and devoured by wolves that overrun the district. Guertin's mother resides at Cumberland street.

A MORE LIBERAL POLICY

Leading Democrat Urges It to Combat Mr. Chamberlain.

Washington, Nov. 7. — The first speech on the merits of the Cuban bill was made by Mr. Carmack (Dem.), who opposed the bill and said that nothing less than general tariff revision would give the relief needed. Mr. Teller declared that Cuba was in no sense a dependency of the United States. Mr. Carman made a plea for general tariff revision, saying in part: "The tariff movement toward protection in England derived its strength from the hostile tariff of the United States. Mr. Chamberlain has played the United States against the continent of Europe with success, and is now free to execute a hostile tariff in favor of the British colonies and against the United States. This will be a staggering blow to our agricultural industries, but the beginning of a more liberal policy shown by the victory of the Democratic party in the next election would put an end to Mr. Chamberlain's scheme."
