

BRITISH FEELING AGAINST RUSSIA

Delicate Situation Well Managed by Premier Balfour.

PLEDGE FLAGRANTLY BROKEN

Humiliation in Having to Ask British Warships to Carry the Czar's Orders to Buccanering Fleet.

London, Aug. 30.—Prime Minister Balfour may, as some allege, have made a hopeless muddle of the fiscal problem, but unquestionably his cautious yet firm handling of the delicate questions arising from the Russian-Japanese war commands general approval. It is hardly to be doubted that the Russian Government has flagrantly broken the pledge given only a few days ago by the commander-in-chief of the Russian fleet, Admiral Rozhkovsky, that no Russian warships would be permitted to enter the waters of the British Empire. The Russian fleet, it is now known, has been ordered to leave the Baltic and to proceed to the Mediterranean, where it will be under the command of Admiral Rozhkovsky. Tokio, Aug. 28.—The most sensational event of the war thus far was the triple attempt to bottle up the Russian fleet in the harbor of Port Arthur.
