COPERNICUS THE ASTRONOMER.

New York American.1 When the light of this world first met the eyes of the infant Jesus in surroundings formed by strangers his humble home in Nazareth, of Galilee, no one then on earth, outside one could do the Rip Van Winkle act of a paltry few, possibly, in Athens,

The sun, the ruler of the day, shone then as he shines now, and all eyes Mrs. Newrich-"Is your husband beheld his splendor, but what he was, or what was his relationship to the earth, was, to all, save the handful referred to, a profound secret.

> It was Copernicus, who first made the formal announcement of the Hellocentric idea-the idea that the sun, rather than the earth, is the center of our planetary system.

> The Ptolemaic theory, which had remained practically unchanged and unquestioned for fifteen hundred years taught that the earth was the center around which all the heavenly bodies

The Ptolemaic idea is, in a way, the most natural thing in the world. To the unscientific mind, nothing appears truer than the statement that the earth is the center around which the sun revolves, and that the moon and stars are but the embellishment of its "firmament."

Such is the idea taught in the Book of Genesis, and such was the idea in which all Christendom firmly believed in 1473, the year of Copernicus's birth. The work that forced men to substitute the Heliocentric for the Geocentric idea was Copernicus' immortal book, "The Revolutions of the Heavenly Bodies," published in 1543, with a groveling preface and cowardly apology by Copernicus' friend and literary executor, Osiander.

It was the 24th of May, 1543, and Copernicus was on his deathbed. For more than 40 of his three-score years and ten he had thought of his book! The mighty discovery had lain in his mind for a whole generation; the work itself had been ready for the press for many years, and now at last it was printed: printed with that mean apologetic lie of Oslander that its great author had propounded his doctrine, not as a fact but as a hypothesis!

On his bed, Copernicus lay dying: the eyes that had so gloriously swept in the world than book had ever made

Copernicus touched his book, seemed to realize what it was, closed his eyes again, and died. But the truth had been proclaimed: and as soon as men should once fair-

ly see that truth, they would be obliged to admit it. In a way it was a humiliating

The result of the discovery of Copernious was to bring the earth to her real nosition of subordination and inferiority. So far from being the universe, the earth was soon to appear at her true value, as being but one of the smaller satellites of the sun, the sun himself being but one of the millions of other suns, all of them, perhaps, the satellites of some as yet undiscovered mass.

How big is a man, anyway? Well, he is bigger, somewhat than a mosquito, but he is not so big an an elephant, and the elephant is small in comparison with a mountain, and the mountain is a mite beside the earth. and the earth is but a speck in the Solar System, and the Solar System itself is as a single leaf in a mighty forest compared even with that which is revealed by our present-day telescopes!

The great Hegel is said to have penly regretted the overthrow of the ancient astronomy, "because it was more dignified for Man to occupy the center of the universe."

Be that as it may, the fact was shown pretty conclusively by Copernicus that man did not occupy such position; that his earth-home was but an insignificant member of the hierarchy of worlds, and that his highsounding theories about his importance had unquestionably been woven out of his own immeasurable self-
