Rev. Thomas Mitchell Discusses the Subject in an Able

Sermon.

Rev. Thomas Mitchell preached a thoughtful sermon at the New St. James' Presbyterian Church last evening on "The Labor Problem," taking his text from Ruth, ii., 4: "Behold Boaz came from Bethlehem, and said unto the reapers, The Lord be with you. And they answered him, The Lord bless thee."

"What a different attitude the modern capitalist and his employes have toward each other," said Mr. Mitchell. The men of Boaz were glad to see him and he was glad to see them. In the modern industrial world matters are entirely different. There are, as it were, two sides, or two camps, each armed to the teeth and each trying to get the advantage of the other.
