#### A LECTURE ON "TUBERCULOSIS"

Was Given Last Night by Dr. John D. Wilson.

"Tuberculosis" was the subject of a most instructive lecture given in the First Methodist Church last night by Dr. John D. Wilson,

In commencing, Dr. Wilson gave a history of the disease, tracing it back to 1500 C., following these remarks by a history of the tuberculosis bacillus and its discovery by Dr. Koch. People cannot get too much sunlight

and fresh air," said Dr. Wilson. "This refers to people who are in good health, and very much more so to those who show any predisposition whatever to consumption. There are at the present time 89,000 deaths from tuberculosis every year in the United States, and the death rate is increasing. This means a loss in wages and expenses of various kinds of \$200,000,000. A very large percentage of this might be saved by a little care in regard to living. Tuberculosis is practically unknown in wild animals and Domesticated animals, however, are subject to it, and it seems to be in-

"The great cause of infection is dry sputum, which mingles with the air and lodges in the mucous membrane in the throat, bronchial tubes, lungs and all-mentary canal. Public libraries have done much harm in one way. People who are in delicate health will sit in the house reading trashy novels when they should be out in the fresh air getting exercise. Children at school should be warned most strongly against putting pencils and other things in their mouths.

Dr. Wilson went at length into the proper means of ventilating houses in order that sufficient fresh air may be obtained, and gave directions for preventing the spread of the disease. the speaker.

#### STRICT REGULATIONS FOR PICTURE SHOWS

Operating Cabinet Must Not Obstruct Passage-Immoral Scenes Barred.

Toronto, March 16 .- Stringent regulations for the control of the operation of moving picture exhibitions, with a view of lessening danger from fire, have been framed by the Provincial Government and will be brought into effect under the bill which is now act that was passed last session. All \$10, and any violation of the regula- and other schemes of the church durtions will be followed by the forfeiture of the license, which practically means that the offender will be put out of business. It is provided that the operating cabinet must occupy a position which does not interfere with any passageway, and must be lined with asbestos paper, covered with metal, with a door opening outward without any lock, and equipped with an automatic cut-off. Electrical con-

nection must be properly insulated. The regulations also provide for the keeping of flims under fireproof protection, while only the films actualy in use must be kept on the premises. No one under the age of eighteen will be permitted to operate a machine, and his whole attention must be directed to that particular work, no other individual will be allowed to enter the cabinet while the machine is being worked except a police officer entitled to inspect it. An perator violating the regulations will be liable to suspension for five years. Strict regulations have been framed as to the provision of exits and fire extinguishing apparatus, while no pictures depicting crime, scenes of riolence or of an immoral nature must

### COAL RECIPROCITY WITH U.S. OPPOSED

Canadian Producers Say It Would Mean Ruin to Them.

Montreal, Que., March 16.—Canadian soft coal producers are considerably agitated over the report that a reciprocity agreement with Canada on soft coal is now in the Payne bill before Congress. A telegram from Washington states that it is understood that the Canadian Government will remove its tariff on soft coal if the American tariff is taken off. F. L. Wanklyn, vice-president of the Dominion Coal Company, said: "Canadian coal operators have always contended that the Canadian tariff is less onerous to the American operator who seeks to market his coal in Canada than it is to the Canadian operator seeking to market his coal in the United States." Mr. Wanklyn referred to the Canadian customs tariff, which shows that the duty on bituminous coal, round and run-of-mine, coming into Canada from the United States is 60 cents per 2,000 pounds. That the duty on bituminous slack coal that
