### The Popular Loan.

Ald. Stevely's proposal, which was adopted by the city council last night, that a public loan be instituted to relieve the present financial condition in which the city finds itself, appears to be meeting with popular approval. Several well-known citizens called at the city hall today

to secure information on the subject. One gentleman suggested that the debentures should be issued as low as \$50, so that almost every person in the city would have the opportunity of taking up a portion of the \$300,000 which it is desired to raise.

This action of Ald. Stevely's is the direct result of the banks of London refusing to accommodate the city. It is said that while there are several banks here which oney, if it was absolutely necessary to do so, they will not put themselves out, because the Molsons Bank has had the city's account for a number of years, previous to which time it was held by the Bank of Montreal. It was stated at the city hall today that the bankers will not take kindly to the popular loan, inasmuch as the city proposes to pay 5 per cent to the people for the money,

whereas the banks pay only 3 per cent now. It is probable, therefore, that if the popular loan goes through, bank interest in London will be affected by it. Ald. Stevely feels that it would be the height of folly to sell City of London debentures at 90, when they pay 4 per cent interest, and should sell at nearly par.
