TEARING DOWN DECORATIONS

Crewe's Message Congratulates Canada Upon Success-Indomitable Is Travelling Fast.

Quebec, Que., July 30. - The tercentenary festivities are now in their dying hours. Already the removal of the decorations has begun, and within 24 hours the arches, ensigns and immortal mottoes which have adorned the city for two weeks past will have been removed, and Quebec will then settle to the commercial grind of everyday life once more. This morning there was to have been a parade, but this has been cancelled owing to

There are still five or ten thousand strangers in the city, but they are making preparations for their departure. The French frigates are still in the harbor, and the hour of departure is still but a matter of conjecture. The Aube had the misfortune to break her anchor chain some days ago, and all efforts to lift the anchor from the bed of the river have so far proved futile. It is hoped, however, that by tomorrow or Saturday this will be accomplished, and if so the two warships will sail immediately.

This morning Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, received the foilowing cablegram from Lord Crewe, secretary of state for the colonies:
