BOBS IN A FOG

Montreal Demonstration Delayed, But Hero Heartily Welcomed.

Montreal, July 30.—Lord Roberts arrived in the city at 2 o'clock, and was given an enthusiastic welcome. He was expected at 10 o'clock. At that hour a large crowd gathered at the wharf to catch a sight of "Bobs." His yacht was delayed by a fog in the river, and on account of the lateness of the hour of arrival it was found necessary to postpone the reception at the board of trade until tomorrow. Lord Roberts was met at the wharf by a number of influential citizens and was driven without any ceremony to the city hall, where the civic welcome was extended by Acting-Mayor Lapointe. The first cars for the G. T. P. passenger service in the West will leave Montreal next week. They are being assembled at the Point St. Charles works now. They have been in the

service of the G. T. P. for some weeks. They will be used to carry settlers and prospective purchasers of town lots.

GETTING BACK TO THE OLD GRIND

The Dying Hours of the Tercentenary Celebrations.

TEARING DOWN DECORATIONS

Crew's Message Congratulates Canada Upon Success—Indomitable Is Travelling Fast.

Quebec, Que., July 30.—The tercentenary festivities are now in their dying hours. Already the removal of the decorations has begun, and within 24 hours the arches, ensigns and immortal mottoes which have adorned the city for two weeks past will have been removed. Quebec will then settle to the commercial grind of everyday life once more. This morning there was to have been a parade, but this has been cancelled owing to lack of interest.

There are still five or ten thousand strangers in the city, but they are making preparations for their departure. The French frigates are still in the harbor, and the hour of departure is still but a matter of conjecture. The Aubé had the misfortune to break her anchor chain some days ago, and all efforts to lift the anchor from the bed of the river have so far proved futile. It is hoped, however, that by tomorrow or Saturday this will be accomplished, and if so the two warships will sail immediately.

This morning Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, received the following cablegram from Lord Crewe, secretary of state for the colonies: "Now that the Quebec celebrations are at an end, I wish to congratulate Canada and the governor-general upon the singular success which has attended them. The tercentenary Empire as a whole is much to be congratulated upon the loyalty and hearty co-operation within its borders, and as a happy omen for the future."

The last report from the Indomitable, bearing the name of Wales back to England, received at noon today, was from Fame Point last night at midnight, where the vessel passed. Fame Point is 325 miles below Quebec, which would allow a speed of several knots an hour for the Indomitable, which is fast going, considering the difficulty of navigating the river to that point.

BRITISH TARS SAVED MANY LIVES

When the Typhoon Swept Hong Kong—Over 1,000 Chinese Met Death.

Hong Kong, July 30.—The police here estimate the number of deaths from the typhoon that swept this vicinity at 1,000, although other estimates were considerably less.

The river steamer Yinking, en route to Canton, was lost. She carried three hundred passengers, only twelve of whom were saved.

The torpedo boat destroyer Whiting went ashore at Lyceum Pass, and the river steamer *Santon* sank at near wharf and probably is a total loss.

There were many heroic rescues, the searchlight of the *Astraea* enabling the cruiser's cutter to put out and save many after a desperate fight with the elements.

A junk's crew was rowed ashore in the cutter, and many other Chinese were rescued from sinking sampans by Europeans with the aid of the searchlight.

Damage to property is enormous. Houses and countless trees were uprooted and steamers driven ashore.

The *Latsang* was towed off by the *Pochoontas* and the *Schuyk* by the *Aeolus*. Others driven ashore were the *Holching*, the *Persia* and the *Charles Hardouin*.

GRAIN GROWS TOO FAST

Heat in West Hurrying It Along—Yield 120,000,000 Bushels.

Winnipeg, July 30.—The weather is decidedly cooler today, and is showing signs of a lightening of the intense heat wave of the past week, which undoubtedly had considerable injurious effect on the crop, by bringing on the grain too fast, drying up the rain, and checking full development of wheat in the ear.

Completed reports probably will show July the hottest for many years, and being accompanied by unusually hot nights, there are good reasons to expect that threshing returns will show considerable falling off from earlier prospects of bumper yield.

The yield should, however, be up to a 20-bushel average, and with increased acreage this should give 120,000,000 bushels. Seldom has the outlook been so bright for so high an average for export and grade wheat.

The intense heat of the past few days has been accompanied by scattered thunderstorms, accompanied by hail, much injury being done crops in isolated districts, such as Fillmore, where serious damage was done to the community, including one death, several broken limbs, and general destruction to farm property. Cultivation, however, now covers so wide an area that the general effect of the local hail losses is minimized.

AN IMPOSTER.

Montreal, July 30.—The Bert Shaughnessy, who attempted suicide in Seattle yesterday and claimed to be a son of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., is an imposter.

Sir Thomas has no son named Bert, and both his boys are at home in Montreal.

A FARM HAND BADLY BEATEN

Says He Was Chastised for Raising Objections as to His Food.

Because he objected to eating off dirty dishes, it is alleged that David Solmskey, a Hibernian farm laborer, was cruelly beaten and rendered unconscious by his employer, Percy Seabrook, of Komoka, last evening. Solmskey's injuries were dressed at Victoria Hospital, and today he laid information before Squire Taylor, charging Seabrook with assault and battery.

According to Solmskey's story he had engaged in the early part of the summer to work for Mr. Seabrook for six months, at approximately \$25 per month. Solmskey's working hours, according to his story, were from 5 a.m. until 10 and 11 p.m., and in order that he might do more work he was given a cold dinner and supper in the field.

Yesterday Solmskey entered objection to the cup provided him for his tea, claiming that it was unfit to drink from. He furthermore asked that he be given warm meals instead of cold ones. Upon this, it is alleged by Solmskey, that Seabrook rushed at him and struck him a blow behind the ear, knocking him senseless. Solmskey's face bears marks of rough usage, his lips being cut and badly bruised, and one ear injured. When Solmskey came to his senses after being knocked down, he says he found his employer standing over him with a dishpan of cold water, presumably to be used in bringing the hired man to his senses. Solmskey then got up and made his way to the home of a nearby farmer, who gave him lodging for the night, and today brought him to the city.

It is alleged that while Solmskey was at the home of the neighboring farmer that his former employer called upon him to get him to go back to work under condition that warm meals be furnished him. This Solmskey refused to do, saying that he was done with the Seabrook farm.

CANNIBALS EAT MISSION BOYS

Gory Tale Told of Savagery in the Bismarck Archipelago.

Victoria, B. C., July 30.—Murders and cannibalism in the Bismarck Archipelago followed by a German punitive expedition in which some villages were burned and the capture of a trading schooner and murder of Oliver Burns, a Sydney trader, in the Solomon Group, was brought by the steamer *Aorangi*, which arrived tonight from Australia via Honolulu.

Three mission boys were victims of the cannibalistic affair in the Bismarck group, which is under German control. Rev. W. Danks' mission station was attacked at Baining, and the three boys who were captured were killed and their bodies carried to the hills, where a feast was held. The remains were roasted and devoured. Evidence of the fact were found by an expedition sent to punish the natives. One of the party, a German trader, named Schmidt, was mortally wounded by a spear.

The same mission was the scene of a massacre in 1904, when the mission station was rushed and five missionaries and teachers and five sisters were massacred.

Oliver Burns, victim of the natives in the Solomons, had a trading station at Marova Lagoon. His trading schooner, anchored off the shore, was seized and looted, and he was tomahawked. Two blacks boarded the schooner to trade, and while Burns was stooping to pick up some goods he was struck from behind with an axe. The trader's rifle was then seized, and the natives then looted the schooner. Kerosene was found in the vessel, and it was scattered about and the schooner set on fire after being looted. CASE OF LYSSOPHOBIA

Or Hydrophobia Resulting From Auto-Suggestion.

Toronto, July 30.—The case of Robert McGill, who had symptoms of suffering from hydrophobia, even endeavoring to bite his mother, has been diagnosed by Dr. Anderson, who has been in charge of the case since the lad was taken to St. Michael's Hospital yesterday afternoon.

"It's a case of lyssophobia," said the doctor, "and he is better today. If he continues the same as he is now he will be out in a few days."

"What is lyssophobia?" "It's a stimulation of the real thing, hydrophobia, caused by auto-suggestion. The lad had been bitten some time ago by a dog, and he had been reading and thinking about it too much. He was in a very nervous state and that brought on the lyssophobia. That is allied to hysteria."

SHOT HIS BROTHER

Bad Accident Results From Boys Playing With Rifle.

Ingersoll, July 30.—A serious accident happened yesterday on the farm of Mr. Judson Haycock, as a result of which Sydney Haycock, the 8-year-old son of Mr. Jefferson Haycock, second concession of Dereham Township, received a bullet in the head.

The boys were visiting their uncle, and found a 22-calibre rifle, which, in the course of their play, was discharged.

The bullet entered Sydney's head and

inch and a half behind the left ear, traversed the parietal gland, injuring the facial nerve, and producing paralysis on the left side of the face. It lodged in the deep muscles of the face near the left ear. It is not known if the injuries will prove fatal.
