PREVIOUS DEATH CAUSED BY RABIES

Dundas Case Recalls Another Instance in Lambton County a Few Years Ago.

IN TOWNSHIP OF KING, TOO

Toronto Man Tells of Sad Event Years Ago-Wound Had Been Cauterized.

J. Ewart Brown, M.D., 501 Markham street, writes to the Toronto Star as follows:

During the winter of 1896 I was called to attend a case of hydrophobia in the village of Arkona, Lambton County, Ontario, where I was at that time practicing. The case of the young boy who died

in Hamilton on March 1 recalls the case I attended fourteen years ago. Deaths from hydrophobia are very rare; in fact, so much so, that few physicians in our Province have even had the opportunity of seeing one. It may be of interest to recall, in brief, the case which came under my own observation, especially at this time, when there is considerable anxiety in reference to this dreaded dis

On Jan. 27, 1896, a large hound was seen running through the streets, but no attention was paid to him as it was thought to be owned by a farmer in the country. The dog gave no sign of being mad, as he was not snapping at people, or foaming at the mouth "I don't know, but I un larsaard they've two signs usually coupled with hydrophobia. He was seen fighting with two or three dogs, and a boy passing him on the street struck him with a stick. He jumped at the boy and bit him in the face. The wound was cauterized and dressed, and soon healed. was, however, no apprehension of the dog being mad, and nothing more was thought of the case at the time.

About three weeks later, the mer-chant's dog took sick, a veterinary surgeon was called in, but could no detect any symptoms that might lead to a correct diagnosis. The dog was not very irritable, and allowed his master to handle him and give him medicine; he did not froth at the mouth, but seemed to be chilled, and shook at short intervals. A couple of days later his hind legs became paralyzed, and he died the following day

Could Not Drink.
The following day I was called to see the boy, aged eleven. He had been home from school a couple of days not feeling very well. His symptoms first appearance were much thos seen in a case of grip, but, or asking him to take a swallow of water I was astonished to see attacked by severe spasms of the muscles of the throat and neck. I had two consultations in the case. spasms became general over the entire body, and a day later were followed by a paralysis, terminating in death on March 2, and just 34 days after h

Many people have an erroneous impression that if a person is afflicted by hydrophobia he will froth at the mouth bark like a dog, and snap at people the frequent spasms in the muscles of the throat, and often great difficulty in breathing, he will make a noise re sembling that of a child taking in breath after a severe coughing spel whooping cough, which has taken for a bark.
