BRITISH DIPLOMACY AT HAGUE TRIBUNAL

Not Sacrificing Canada to Curry Favor With the United States.

The Hague, Sept. 6 .- Now that the to war, one outstanding feature has been developed by the research necessary for the presentation of the facts, which should not go unnoticed, and which should be said by a Canadian.

In times past, and even not very remote, it has been said in Canada, and with a persistence designed to drive home the suggestion, that the desire on the part of England for friendly relations with the United States has led to the sacrificing of Canadian interests. This suggestion has been based upon the assertion of a weak or luke-warm diplomacy by England when dealing with questions in which Canada was vitally interested.

Mischievous Statement. Now, this statement is easily made, and it has created at times a deep impression. Nothing could be more mischievous than such a statement, all the more dangerous, because though easily made, it could not be denied without even a full knowledge of all the facts concerning any one dispute. It has taken years of research, the expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars, the searching of the archives of Great Britain. Canada and Newfoundland to present the history connected with this fisheries dispute, which has gone into the third month of discussion, producing a record of some 2,000,000 words, besides printed cases, counter-cases and official documents, covering perhaps 1,000 pages, already placed before the tribunal. In the last protocol issued the president, Dr. Lammasch, said:

"You have led us through the maze of a hundred years of diplomatic correspondence, through the jungle of entanglement, through the dark forest of metaphysical problems, in which it was sometimes difficult to see our path.'

This statement shows what research has been necessary to obtain a knowledge of even one dispute.

Now, with all the facts marshalled at this great expense, a Canadian who would let the opportunity pass, and not state what the result has shown, would be neglecting an opportunity to do justice to English statesmen

Examples of British Diplomacy. I would not assume to be competent to express an opinion on any subject in the columns of your newspaper, especially in a case looked upon as the most important ever dealt with before the court which England's attorney-general described as "the world's greatest court," but, having had the responsibility of certifying to the tribunal, every word that forms the record of the oral statements, upon which the case will be decided, I feel competent to state a fact. A perusal of the records will demonstrate beyond a doubt that this great fisheries dispute should form a fair example of British diplomacy. As a Canadian I feel jutified in saying that should any statement herewere sacrificed at any time, in this case, in all the hundred years of British be a cruel misrepresentation and unfair. Time and again the tribunal have listened to documents which showed that the two great nations were on the verge of war, that war was averted only by the good sense, not weakness, of a statesman, first in one country and then in the other. Senator Root testified to this in the first hour of his great speech when he told the tribunal that during all these years each country had held to its ground, and that neither being willing to recede, there were only two solutions, war or arbitration.
