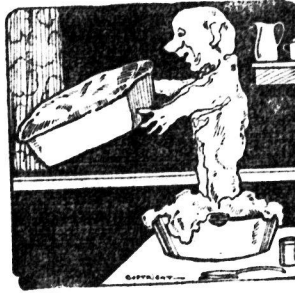

Special Committee Will Have to Report on the Subject to the City Council Shortly.

The aldermen are divided as to the site for the new city hall. The "V" on Richmond street, the courthouse site, and Dundas and Waterloo streets, have their advocates, and there is a certain element in favor of a site down town, say, where the Bank of Montreal and the Merchants' Bank buildings are located, on Richmond street.

Major Beattie, who has stood out in favor of the "V" for a long time, is wavering, and favors a more central location. He suggests the site opposite the custom houses, or any one in the business section. He has obtained an option on one piece of property.

Some of the aldermen would not state definitely what site they favored, but they were opposed to selling the city hall for \$100,000, and paying practically the same sum of money for another site, which might not be as advantageous as the present. The majority prefer having plenty of land if it is possible to secure it.

The Choice.

It looks as if the choice will be between the "V" and the courthouse property. A certain number are very strongly in favor of the latter. Whether or not they will be able to swing the majority of the council their way is another story.

The "V" has many friends, too, and there are some who favor Dundas and Waterloo streets, as a business section, and the opinion that the hotel property, at the corner of Talbot and Carling streets, owned by the late Provincial Auditor, J. R. Loring, would be a good location, and it is said it can be secured at a reasonable price.

What the Aldermen Say.

Ald. Richter: I have not selected a site as yet. We have no facts to go on.

Ald. Saunders: We do not know what we can get any site for. We do not want to be held up, nor do we intend to be. I have heard of no offer whatever, and until the special committee has some information to us, I cannot see how we can form an intelligent opinion. We want a good site, but we do not want to pay two prices for it.

Ald. Ashplant: I want the site that will be most acceptable to the citizens. They should suggest the best site to us. I cannot see why we should not have one of these proposed sites. Some of these proposed sites are somewhat expensive, and we do not want to run up the cost of the building too high.

Ald. Tancock: My own opinion is that two sites should be selected, and the people allowed to vote on them. I cannot see why we should not have one of these proposed sites. Some of these proposed sites are somewhat expensive, and we do not want to run up the cost of the building too high.

Ald. Wilson: My first choice is the "V" on Richmond street. If that is not selected, any good site near the business centre will suit me.

Ald. Mitchell: Keep the city hall down town. I have not considered any particular site as yet, but I prefer to have it close to the business section, not away from it as suggested by some.

Ald. Morgan: I still favor the courthouse site. If that is not satisfactory, why not purchase the west side of Richmond street, north of the courthouse, and build a city hall there. We could make a fine park in addition, and it would cost a very great deal of money. A site opposite the custom house would be all right, but it would cost a lot of money.

Ald. Donnelly: We should have some houses before us as to the probable cost of the sites. Some of them would be very high, particularly the one down town. I suggested a site opposite the building with plenty of land about it. We should look to the future and erect a structure that will last for years. Either the "V" or a site at Waterloo and Dundas would be acceptable to me. Which would get the choice would depend largely on the condition of price.

KAISER SHOWS YEARS; IS ALMOST REPOSEFUL

No Longer a Marvellous Storehouse of Apparently inexhaustible Energy.

Berlin, Jan. 31.—The new photograph of the Kaiser, which was published in connection with his birthday, reveals the fact that William II. is rapidly becoming an old man. The remarkable vitality which characterized him in middle age is disappearing.

The Emperor's face betrays many signs of approaching senescence. There are deep creases and wrinkles about the eyes and nose, the cheeks are becoming drawn and pained, the eyes have lost the brilliant fire of youth and the hair has already reached a deep tinge of gray. These indications which are so evident in the Kaiser's latest photographs have also become noticeable to those constantly in his environment.

Marvellous Energy Wanes.

That astonishing energy which was the Kaiser's most prominent characteristic in former years has been replaced by a kind of passive acquiescence in the things that happen. Where he formerly uttered a hundred words he now utters ten. Instead of dashing about day by day, from early morning until late at night, he has become of almost reposeful habits, and in this respect it has become easier to live in his vicinity, because his friends and attendants to the point of exhaustion.

Together with these symptoms, the Emperor has become more moderate and less impetuous in his judgments. He is no longer the same determined upholder of imperial autocracy, and he may, if the present process continues, develop into a constitutional monarch of his own free will. Age is bringing about a radical change in the Kaiser, and the Kaiser of 1911 promises to be a radically different man from the Kaiser of 1901.

Duke Becomes Boniface

The reigning Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, a nephew of the late King Edward and cousin to the Kaiser, has gone into the business of hotelkeeper at Oberhof, a health resort on the summit of the Thuringian Mountains. Oberhof possesses the natural qualities of a health resort, but the place lacked suitable accommodations.

The duke, seeing this, has erected a modern, luxurious hotel.

The duke visits the establishment once a fortnight, reviews accounts, inspects the general course of affairs and keeps a tight grip on the enterprise. His going into business has made him immensely popular among his subjects, and especially the residents of the Oberhof district.
