
SOME CALENDAR HISTORY. The present calendar now in use originated in the year 46 B. C., and provides for a year of 365% days, excepting leap year, every four years, which contains 366 days. A mistake,

which, however, was rectified later by Pope Gregory XIII., resulted from the fact that the ordinary year contained not only 3651/4 days, but also eleven minutes. Pope Gregory adjusted this error by issuing a decree advancing the calendar ten days, and also provided that thereafter the century years would not be leap years, excepting those divisible by 400.
