PROVINCIAL ELECTION, PERTH COUNTY. Rear parties from each unit, with the exception of the 168th and 186th Overseas Battalions, consisting of one officer, and 25 other ranks, will be left behind to clear up the camp grounds. The rear parties will leave by special train on Sunday, with the grooms and horses.
