Boston Red Sox Are World's Champions

Defeat Brooklyn 4 to 1 in the Fifth and Final Game of Series.

Receipts and Attendance Establish a New Record

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—The Boston Americans firmly clamped the baseball laurels of the universe upon their brows here this afternoon when they defeated the Brooklyn Nationals by a score of 4 to 1, in the fifth and final game of the world's series of 1916. The greatest gathering in the history of the American national sport, witnessed the gathering, 42,620 persons departing after the contest, convinced that the Boston Americans were the baseball machine par excellence of recent years.

As a result of the four games to one conquest over the standard-bearers of the National League, Boston is tonight celebrating its fifth victory in world's series since 1918, and there is added joy in the fact that never in its history has a Boston team been forced to bow to the superior prowess of a rival in such combat.

No Room for Argument. The victory over the Superbas in the final meeting of the teams was so clean-cut and decisive that there was left no ground for argument. That the better team won the championship despite the determined battles put up by Brooklyn in the earlier games of the series was obvious. Before the game and during the game, the Superbas were well nigh helpless, while Jeff Pfeffer, the last hope of Brooklyn, proved unequal to the task of holding the Red Sox in check.

Although the National League champions were first to score, their advantage was short-lived and once the Bostonians unlimbered their heavy batting artillery, any doubt regarding the outcome of the game was dispelled. So closely did Shore hold the Brooklyn team in the mystery of his deceptive delivery. The invaders were able to score but three hits for a similar total of bases and the solitary run scored was unearned. It was the result of a pass, a sacrifice, an out and a passed ball. Boston, on the other hand, collected ten bases on seven hits, and two of its four runs were earned.

Too Easy For Thrills. Although the contest was played before a record crowd of fans, there was only a moderate amount of enthusiasm, the chilling weather and the ease with which the Sox disposed of their opponents dulling the edge of such outbursts as sprang from grandstands and bleachers at the more thrilling points of the game.

Aside from Shore's clever coddle, whether hurling and a sensational running

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—The attendance and receipts for today's game established a new record in this department of world series history, supplanting the figures made in the same park October 11 a year ago, when the amounts were a few hundred less. The attendance for the five games this season aggregated 162,359 and the receipts \$385,590.50. Of this sum the players received \$162,927.40, each club \$92,652.02 and the National Commission \$35,590.09. The Boston club, as winners, divided \$97,756.47, on a basis of 25 shares, which the players are understood to have agreed upon as the method of apportionment. This would allow \$3,910.26 a share. The twenty-three Brooklyn players divided \$65,976.16 into equal shares. Owing to the fact that there are more players to share in the winners' money this year the individual shares are not a record.

shoe-top catch by Wheat of the Superbas off Shore in the fifth, and its mate by Lewis in the eighth when he robbed Merkle, batting for Pfeffer, of an apparently sure double, the game was devoid of feature plays.

Immediately after Scott had clinched the championship by gobbling Mowrey's short fly for the final out of the game the younger element among the spectators rushed upon the field and fell in behind the royal rosters and their band for a parade. On the first circuit of the diamond they captured President J. J. Lanning of the Boston club, and then crossed the field, after President C. H. Ebbets of Brooklyn. Amid the cheers of the fans, the rival club executives joined arms and led the march. Many of the fans shook hands with the Red Sox players and with Manager Carrigan, who said again that he had retired from professional baseball with today's game.

Brooklyn's Only Rally. As was the case in yesterday's game Brooklyn was the first to score. Its only tally came in the second, when Shore issued his only pass of the day, sending Cutshaw to first. Mowrey sacrificed him to second, from which point he moved to third on Olson's infield out, and scored when Shore uncovered the plate with a passed ball. Boston immediately tied the score in their half of the inning when Lewis tripped to left and came home as Wheat threw the ball recovered from Gardner's hit. Hooper walked and Cady's effort to get him at the plate. The Red Sox added two more in the next inning. Cady hit a bouncer over Daubert's head. Hooper walked and Cady scored when Olson threw Janvrin's grounder into center field in an attempted double play. Hooper rounded home from third on Shorten's hit over second. The fourth and final run was gathered in the fifth on Janvrin's single and Janvrin's double. After that the Red Sox, aided by Shore's air-tight twirling, played defensive ball and the Superbas never threatened.

First Inning.

Brooklyn—Meyers, first up for Brooklyn, fanned on three pitched balls, without offering at any of them. Cady threw out Daubert at first on an easy roller. Shorten, c.f., fanned. Scott got Stengel's grounder and threw wildly to first. Stengel, however, being held there. Wheat fouled out to Hoblitzel.

Second Inning.

Brooklyn—Cutshaw walked on four straight balls, and Mowrey sacrificed him to second. Gardner threw out Olson to first. Cutshaw going to third, whence he scored on a passed ball. Scott retired Meyers at first. One run.

Boston—Pfeffer got Hoblitzel at first base. Lewis shot the ball to the left field fence for a three-base hit. Wheat played the ball badly, and it bounded over his head. Gardner sacrificed neatly, scoring Lewis. Wheat's throw to the plate was very wide. Scott flied out to Meyers.

Third Inning.

Brooklyn—Pfeffer struck out. Gardner took Meyers' easy roller, and threw him out. Daubert was nailed at first on an easy one to Shore.

Boston—Cady singled over Daubert's head. Shore fouled out to Meyers, trying to bunt. Hooper walked, Cady going to second. Cady scored when Olson fumbled Janvrin's grounder and then threw wildly past Cutshaw. Hooper went from first to third on the play, and Janvrin went out stealing. Meyers pitched to Olson. Hooper scored on Shorten's pop single to center. Shorten out stealing. Meyers to Olson. Two runs.

Fourth Inning.

Brooklyn—Stengel sent up a lofty fly to Shorten. Wheat struck out. Shore took Cutshaw's feeble effort, and threw him out at first. Shore was absolutely unshakable.

Fifth Inning.

Brooklyn—Gardner took Mowrey's puzzling smash, and threw him out. Olson flied to Short. Meyers got an infield single when the ball bounced off Shore's glove. It was Brooklyn's first hit of the game. Gardner retired Pfeffer.

Boston—Olson disposed of Cady after a good play on his grounder. Wheat made a clever running catch of Shore's line drive, which was labelled for three bases, had it gone safe. Hooper singled to right, and scored on Janvrin's two-base hit to left. Janvrin went to third on a wild pitch. Shorten struck out. One run.

Sixth Inning.

Brooklyn—Meyers flied to short. Gardner cleverly fielded Daubert's bouncer, and got him at first base. Stengel popped to Scott.

Boston—Hoblitzel went out to Daubert unassisted. Lewis shot a single over Mowrey's head, but was forced by Gardner, who went to second on a wild pitch. Scott was retired by Mowrey.

Seventh Inning.

Brooklyn—Wheat flied to Hooper. Shore tossed out Cutshaw. Mowrey singled past Scott, for Brooklyn's first clean hit. Scott fumbled Olson's grounder, and then threw wildly over Hoblitzel's head. Mowrey going to third and Olson second. It was Scott's first error of the series.

Boston—Cady fouled out to Mowrey. Shore struck out. Hooper went out. Cutshaw to Daubert.

Eighth Inning.

Brooklyn—Merkle batted for Pfeffer and flied to Lewis, who made a shoe-string catch. Meyers tried to bunt, and popped to Stengel. Daubert went out. Scott to Hoblitzel.

Ninth Inning.

Brooklyn—Stengel singled to left.

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One Record Broken By O. A. C. Athlete

O. C. Evans, '17, Smashes Hop, Step and Jump Figure at Twenty-Fifth Annual Field Day—Tie for Grand Championship.

[Special to The Advertiser.] GUELPH, Oct. 12.—Ideal weather conditions drew a big field to the O. A. C. 25th annual field and track day this afternoon at the college campus. One record that has stood for a long time was broken by O. C. Evans of the '17 class, who cleared 42 feet 1 inch in the running hop-step, which was 7 inches over the record. D. W. Wallace came within half an inch of equaling the running broad jump mark, which has stood for 24 years at 19 feet 4 1/2 inches. This was made by S. Curzon in 1892. He was in attendance at the games today. D. W. Wallace and O. C. Evans tied for the grand championship, with 35 points each. The results were:

TWO FEATURES AT LEXINGTON CLOSING

Lee Axworthy Makes New Record for Stallions.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 12.—Lee Axworthy, champion trotting stallion of the world, driven to a wagon by one of his owners, Harry K. Devereaux, of Cleveland, lowered the wagon record of 2:05 1/2 for trotting stallions, to 2:02 1/2, on the final day of the 44th annual meeting of the Kentucky Horse Breeders' Association here today.
Volga, champion 3-year-old mare, started to beat her mark of 2:04 1/2, but tired in the stretch after trotting the third quarter in 30 1/2 seconds, and completed the mile in 2:05 1/2.
These two exhibitions featured the final program, the three races on the card being won in straight heats. Lee Axworthy took the 2:20 trot, Little Frank D. the 2:10 pace, and Binville the 2:12 trot.
Though the official program was completed today, the meeting will be continued tomorrow to permit horsemen to start 30 horses for records.
