FINE QUALITY IN NEEDLE WORK CAPTURES PRIZES THIS YEAR

Toronto and Port Arthur Artists Carry Off Large Number of Awards At Exhibition—Western Ontario Competitors Make Splendid Showing.

Judging by the quantity of work they have turned out, the variety of their entries and the number of times their names appear in the Western Fair prize lists compiled by the judge, Miss M. Viola Powell of Toronto, a number of Ontario women have turned their talent for needlework to excellent account in the past year.

While the majority of the exhibitors are Western Ontario women, Toronto and northern Ontario exhibitors have carried off an exceptionally large share of the honors.
