A statement of the mineral production of Canada in 1892, just issued from the Geological Survey D partment at Otraws, shows the great total value of \$19,500,000. The largest item is cool, of which the quantity is stated at 3,290,897 tons, valued at \$7,181,610 Other non-metallic substances, including various structural materials, represent a total of about \$6,750,000. The metallic mineral productions is thus given in the order of value; Nickel, \$3,513,3,9; gold, \$900,483; copp. 7, \$821,589; silver, \$264,510; iron ore, \$254,206; lead, \$49,422; and platinum, \$3,500; total, \$5,807,049. The British Columbia gold was computed at \$17, per cance, and the silver at \$65 cents per counce. The re-ort just issued contains only a summary statement. The complete annual report, with details of the various mineral industries and the materials information regarding mineral discovery and development, will appear later.
