of this matter was to be found in the forming of municipalities. That had been done in the best manner in the United States, where the individual states did little or nothing for the farmers.

The Premier said that as a representative of one of the most extensive farming districts in the province, he thought of something about the farmers. He then told of the struggles of the settlers on the north side of the coast, and he could tell the House that those settlers of Dewdney ridge, realizing the financial predicament which British Columbia was facing, were willing to bear their fair share of the burden now.

Mr. Drury a little later denied this, and took occasion to denounce the government for the assessment bill. Mr. McLellan said Mr. Drury had just informed the House that the banks had demanded that this assessment bill must be passed before any other bill could be implemented by them. He went on at considerable length on this theme.
