This alarmed the milk dealers, and they bought him off by giving him a high wholesale price for his milk. The milkmen have also spoken of competition, but as a matter of fact they all fail into line at the order of the executive and up goes the price of milk, and the ring is com-plete. Whenever a new dealer starts he is soon roped into the ring and thereby the price is kept up. A still further fact is this, that milk can be sold as cheap in winter as in summer months, even though the farmers somewhat raise their price because one delivery in winter is sufficient, there is a saving of \$5 a week on ice, and a saving of 10 to 20 per cent. on loss of milk going bad by reason of hot weather. In winter every drop of milk in the can can be sold. Still further, milk can be delivered on Saturday evening for Sunday, which is not the case in summer. The milkmen have no high priced stores, no rent and gas bills to pay of any account, and yet they are demanding a profit on their invest ment of over 100 per cent, while other tradesmen and dealers are content with 20 per cent, and have heavy expenses to pay out of that.
