The last public statement of the inspector, "that he does not believe there exists a house of ill-fame in this city," is so flagrantly absurd that it becomes a serious question as to the advisability of maintaining an official at the head of a costly department so manifestly incompetent to cope with the necessity that impelled its formation.

It is unnecessary to go beyond the records of the police court, where prosecutions of keepers and frequenters of houses of ill-fame are of daily occurrence. We learn that the statement of facts, yet it certainly looks suspicious, but perhaps the most charitable conclusion is that we have an Inspector of Morality so completely hedged in by the narrow confines of personal experience and limited intelligence as to be unable to discern what immorality consists of.
