**The White Plague.**  
 "The increase in the number of cases  
 of typhoid fever in the Province and the  
 number of deaths resulting from them is  
 a warning to the public to look after their  
 drinking water," said Dr. Hodgetts,  
 Provincial Health Officer, this morning.  
 The mortality report, which has just been  
 received, shows 51 cases, with 17 deaths  
 resulting, as against 42 cases with only  
 six deaths during the same month last  
 year. There were 143 deaths from con-  
 sumption. The total number of deaths  
 from all causes was 2,078, an increase of  
 100 over last year.

**Cobalt Strikers Beaten.**  
 Cobalt, Ont., July 26.—To all appear-  
 ances, the strike seems to be gradually  
 petering out. Not more than about eight  
 or nine hundred strikers are at present  
 living in the camp.  
 "Unless they soon come to terms,"  
 said Secretary Doty, "an order will be  
 issued by the union for all strikers to  
 leave the camp."  
 The Badger mine, he stated, had ac-  
 cepted the union terms and a committee  
 of the union is negotiating with the Red  
 Rock Mining Co. in regard to sending  
 men back to work.  
 As for those mining companies which  
 signed the owners' schedule, they are ap-  
 parently persistent in their determination  
 not to recognize the union or the Western  
 Federation of Miners. Nearly all of them  
 have resumed operations with reduced  
 staffs, which are daily increasing.

**BRITISH JUSTICE MOVES SWIFT-  
 LY.**

**New York Judge Views Trial Notes  
 How System Differs in America.**  
 New York, July 26.—A London dis-  
 patch lengthily quotes Justice Vernon  
 M. Davis, of the New York supreme  
 court, on the difference between Ameri-  
 can and English criminal trials to the  
 disparagement of the former. Justice  
 Davis, it will be remembered, presided at  
 the second trial of Nan Patterson, for the  
 killing of Caesar Young the turf man.  
 His remarks followed his attendance in  
 the central criminal court, London, at the  
 trial of John Smith and "Chicago May"  
 Churchill for the attempted assassination  
 of Edward Guerin, of Devil's Island fame.  
 Justice Davis sat on the bench with Jus-  
 tice Darling and saw Smith sentenced to  
 life imprisonment after a trial of scarcely  
 six hours.

Justice Davis was asked if he thought  
 such a speedy trial would be possible in  
 America. To this he replied:  
 "Not under present circumstances.  
 There are two principal considerations  
 which militate such celerity. The first  
 of these is in connection with the selec-  
 tion of the jury. Everyone in America reads  
 the newspapers. It is almost impossible  
 to get together 12 men who have not  
 studied the case and reached a judgment  
 unfitting them for jury service. In to-  
 day's case the jury was selected in ex-  
 actly two minutes.  
 "Undoubtedly, however, the chief fac-  
 tor in expediting trials here is the absence  
 of appeals. This does away with the con-  
 stant interruptions arising out of objec-  
 tions by opposing counsel. As there is  
 no appellate division here, there are prac-  
 tically no objections and the trial pro-  
 ceeds rapidly and smoothly."

**LAST IN MIDDLESEX.**  
 Township of London Buys Toll Road  
 for \$11,000.

The Township of London, Middlesex,  
 has notified the Ontario Government of  
 the purchase of the last toll road in the  
 county, at a cost of \$11,000. The govern-  
 ment's share of the cost is \$3,300. The  
 road is twelve miles long.  
 There are still a dozen toll roads in  
 eastern Ontario.  
 Frontenac is asking the government to  
 approve of a bylaw establishing a system  
 of roads for that county. This involves  
 the purchase of the Kingston-Perth toll  
 road. There are two left in Frontenac.  
 The Ontario order in council passed  
 recently, approving of a system of good  
 roads for Perth County, involves an ex-  
 penditure of \$225,000, of which the govern-  
 ment will bear one-third. Two hun-  
 dred and sixty miles of road are to be  
 taken over.
