LAMBTON'S GOOD ROADS SUPERINTENDENT

Lambton County’s genial Superin-
tendent of Roads, is a practical, self-
educated, dyed-in-the-wool “good
roads booster.” He is a man that un-
derstands the needs of the rural dis-
tricts and is delivering “value re-
ceived” for every dollar expended.

Mr. McCallum spent over fifteen
years in contract work for town-
ships and county and has been in
charge of county work for the past
three years.

He has under his supervision nearly
400 miles of road, sixty miles of
which is Provincial County road.
The appropriations for good roads
the first year Mr. McCallum was in
charge totalled \$40,000. Last year
the appropriations totalled nearly
\$120,000, and this year’s estimates
call for sums that will aggregate
nearly \$140,000.

Perhaps the greatest economical
achievement in the good roads pro-
grams for this county was the work-
ing out of a scheme of laying down
gravel at a price several hundred per
cent. lower than the lowest pre-war
price. Mr. McCallum was the father
of this scheme of utilizing motor
trucks and trailers. In one instance
gravel was hauled twelve miles and
spread at a net cost of less than 70
cents per yard.

Mr. McCullum is a native of
Middlesex county; at present living
at Alvington. He is 58 years of age
and going stronger than ever.

members present. Minutes of pre-
vious meetings read and confirmed.

and \$5.50 printing Donald drain de-
bentures; The Municipal World for
supplies and subs.; W. J. French and
F. Sercombe \$15.00 each salary as
auditors; Forest Basket Factory
\$13.50 for plank; Tax Collector
\$16.68 for uncollectable taxes; W.
H. Trick \$15.00 for a sheep killed
and Richard Wilson \$2 inspecting
sheep.

The clerk was instructed to write
to A. Ware re barberry plants. A
resolution was passed to purchase a
strip of land on lot No. 4, Con. 19
for a road.

The reeve and clerk were author-
ized to sign a petition showing that
\$9110.92 was expended upon the
roads in 1920 and requesting the
statutory grant on that amount as
provided by the Ontario Highways
Act.

Council adjourned to meet on
Monday, March 7th, at 10 a.m.

At the Court of Revision on the
Haney drain bylaw, Mrs. Codrings
assessment was reduced \$14, Wm.
Jennings \$10, E. M. Lester’s \$70,
and F. Rawlings \$30, \$62 was added
to J. W. Bell’s assessment and \$62
to the Dominion Cannery’s assess-
ment.
