KING'S COLLEGE.—We copy from the *Scoti-
an*, the following Petition of the 'Synod of
New Brunswick, in connexion with the
Church of Scotland, to the Legislature pray-
ing that such a Charter may be obtained for
this Institution as may make it both popu-
lar and efficient, the College at present being
under the exclusive control of members of
the Church of England.

The Petition of the undersigned, Ministers &
Elders of the Synod of New Brunswick, in
connection with the Established Church of
Scotland, now met in Fredericton,

HUMBLY SHEWETH:
That feeling a lively interest in the cause
of Education, and in the moral and intellec-
tual improvement of the rising generation,
Your Petitioners are exceedingly desirous
that this Province should enjoy the benefits
of an Academic Institution, in which such
education may be obtained at a moderate
rate.

That your Petitioners, in common with a
large portion of the inhabitants of this Pro-
vince, have felt dissatisfied with the restric-
tions imposed by the Charter of King's Col-
lege, which although erected and endowed
from funds to which all classes of Her Maj-
esty's loyal subjects in this Province have con-
tributed, is placed under the exclusive con-
trol of members of the Church of England,
and confers peculiar advantages on that
Church.

That your Petitioners in suing for the
opening up of the College are actuated by no
party views, or hostility to the Church of
England, but by an anxious wish to see the
College made useful to all classes, who may
wish to avail themselves of the facilities it
might afford, for imparting a sound and lib-
eral education to the rising youth of the Colo-
ny. And your Petitioners earnestly hope,
that this long agitated question may now be
satisfactorily settled, and such a Charter be
obtained for this Institution, as may make it
both popular and efficient.

May it therefore please Your Excellency,
and Honours, and Honourable House, to pass
an Act for abolishing the restrictions at pre-
sent existing in the constitution of King's
College aforesaid; and your Petitioners as
in duty bound will ever pray. (Signed)

ARRIVAL OF THE ACADIA.



The ACADIA arrived at Halifax on Friday
last, the 17th inst. after the remarkable short
passage of 12 days.
The English Mail arrived here on Tues-
day night last; and on Wednesday we issued
an extra.
The ACADIA which was to leave Liverpool
on the 4th inst. did not sail on that day in con-
sequence of the severity of the weather.—
By this arrival we have received London pa-
pers to the 3d and Liverpool to the 4th inst.,
extracts from which will be found in our col-
umns.

A hurricane had completely swept the
coasts of England and Ireland. The Eng-
lish papers state that it was one of the most
violent storms ever experienced, & that when
all the particulars are known it will prove to
be one of the most fearful and melancholy
ever known.

The accouchment of the Queen is expect-
ed to take place in March.
Lord Melbourne was recovering from a
severe illness.

Trade and Commerce are not relieved
from the severe pressure which has for some
time paralyzed them.

The English Exchequer exhibits officially
a deficiency of a million.

FRANCE.—Louis Philippe, opened the
France Chamber on the 9th Jan. His Maj-
esty was received by deliberate civility, but
was not hailed with rapturous greeting.

MURDER OF SIR R. PEEL'S SECRETARY.
Edward Drummond Esq, the Private Sec-
retary of Sir R. Peel, was murdered on the
20th Jan. by a man named McNaughten,
while proceeding down Charing Cross, Lon-
don, in the open day. The assassin mistook
Mr Drummond for Sir R. Peel—his intention
having been to shoot the Premier.

Sir Charles Metcalfe who has distinguish-
ed himself by his services in the East, and
by his conduct as Governor of Jamaica, has
been appointed to succeed Sir Charles Bag-
got in the Government of Canada, and pro-
ceeds in the ACADIA, this day, to assume his
office. The selection of this gentleman is
most satisfactory.

LIVERPOOL TIMBER MARKET.
Review for the month ending January 31.
Since the beginning of the month there
has been more business doing in our Timber
Market, and at gradually improving prices.
The chief scales have been the following—
and they include all the arrivals up to this
time, with one or two exceptions; say of
Quebec Pine cargoes early in the month at
13 1-2d, but the last sales are up to 14 1-2
per foot, and one cargo is said to have been
over that price. Saint John's of moderate
average sizes, 18 1-2d to 18d per foot has
been obtained. St. John's Spruce Planks
have been sold by the cargo at 2 9-10ths to
2 3-5d, St. Stephens at 2 1-2d, and Mirami-
chi Yellow Pine at 2 11-10ths per foot. Two small
cargoes of Quebec Yellow Pine Deals have
been taken at 2 10 per standard—Quebec
Staves are dull of sale. Standard have real-
ized £40 to £47 10s per mille; but no
business has occurred in puncheon.

The Hon. Col. Wyer, we learn from the
New Brunswick, has been offered a seat in
the Executive Council.

**Legislative Council Members Qualification
Bill.**—We regret our limits prevent the
insertion this week of the debate upon Mr.
Fishers Bill providing for the qualification of
Members of the Legislative Council, which
was committed on the 13th. After consid-
erable discussion, the Bill was finally agreed
to and engrossed.—The qualification requir-
ed being fixed at £600.

ROBBERY.—We are informed by Mr. B. R.
Fitzgerald that a short time since the Fish
Store on his Wharf was broke open, and a
barrel of Mackerel and one of Herrings sto-
len. Wishing to discover the thief he kept
about 12 o'clock the store was again entered
and a barrel of Flour taken. Mr. Fitzgerald
saw a man named William Kelly rolling the
barrel of flour off the wharf, the moment he
saw Mr. F. approaching him he made his
escape, leaving the flour behind. Kelly said
that he had a wife and family living in St.
Stephen.

PHILOSOPHICAL AND GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY.

MEAZLES.—This disease has been very
prevalent here for some weeks, and has pro-
ved fatal among the children.

FIRE.—On Saturday night last about 10
o'clock a dwelling house at the Ship Yard,
Brandy Cove, owned and occupied by Mr.
Hill was destroyed by fire, with its con-
tents.

Great Fire at Port au Prince.—A dread-
ful conflagration occurred at Port au Prince
on the 9th ult., by which six hundred houses
were burnt. The fire originated in the shop
of a chemist, who was engaged in preparing
copal varnish. The loss of property is esti-
mated at four million dollars.

Interesting Occurrence.—The National In-
telligence of Monday says:—
We understand that the sword actually
used by Gen. Washington during the Revo-
lutionary War will be presented to Con-
gress to-morrow at 12 o'clock in the House
of Representatives, by a member of the Vir-
ginia delegation. It is presented at the re-
quest of the representatives of Gen. Washing-
ton, in whose possession it has been.

The women of Texas are apparently more
heroic than their lords. When Gen. Hous-
ton's military detachment under Capt. Smith
visited Austin, and seized the public records
to transfer them to Washington, all the few
men in the place, save two, sallied out to a
neighboring settlement for aid to rescue
them. The women of Austin feared that re-
inforcements would reach the scene of action
too late, and manning a piece of artillery,
they loaded it, with the assistance of the two
men, they pointing it at the land office, which
the enemy was plundering, the word fire was
given by a heroine, the daughter of an old
Tennessee Indian fighter. The grape shot
whistled through the fortress of the enemy,
miraculously without doing execution. They
scratched in vain for more ammunition—the
magazine was locked, and thus the Presi-
dent's freebooters escaped out of the place.

Frightful Occurrence.—A little boy in
Warren county, Miss., was killed on the 14th
ult., in the following shocking manner: A
keg of powder had been left open in the house,
and during a temporary absence of the mo-
ther, the child, by some means unknown,
communicated a fire brand to the keg, which
blew up the house.
