FISH HATCHERY A SPOT OF INTEREST

Many Fry Placed In Lakes and Streams.

A spot of considerable interest near Middleton is the Fish Hatchery under the direction of Mr. H. Gates. This place is familiar to many of our readers and splendidly adapted for its purpose. A small spring fed brook was dammed and in the pond so formed hundreds of trout from two pounds weight down have a home. Spawn is removed from these and the little fish hatched out can be seen by thousands and thousands in numbers of shallow troughs both inside and outside the hatchery building. Mr. Gates states that during the present season two and a half million of these fry, trout and salmon have been placed in various lakes and streams throughout Western Nova Scotia. Many lakes if properly fished and free from poaching out of season and free from illegal catching through the ice would now be real paradises for sportsmen. After three or four years in lakes the small trout grow to two pounds or thereabouts in weight and furnish sport that is worth while. In matters of sport we may get a general observance in Nova Scotia when the millennium comes but not much before.

BESCO'S POLICY.

Glance Bay, N. S.—"We will not do business with the executive of the United Mine Workers in Nova Scotia as it is at present constituted," said General Manager H. J. McCann, of the Dominion Coal Company.

The official in question would not go as far as to say that the company or corporation would not do business with the United Mine Workers as an organization, but he did state, and that quite firmly that if any negotiations were to be carried on in the future the company would discuss them with officials other than the present executive, or with committees from the miners. The company was not out to "get" the United Mine Workers but it would refuse to do business with an executive, four of whom, he claimed, were Communists.

He said the company was open to discuss a new contract with a committee from the miners at any time.
