It was resolved to receive the hearty Christian greetings of Brothers Rains and Hardin, of Cincinnati, and to send by them fraternal love and sympathy to the brethren in the States. The brethren and sisters of the Elizabeth Street Church were thanked for the kindnesses and consideration shown the delegates, and thanks were also extended to those churches that had thrown open their doors to the Disciples.

"Resolved, while not going back to the law of Moses for authority therefor, nor regarding it as the Jewish Sabbath day, nevertheless we regard the first day of the week as a day that should, as far as possible, be set apart for religious exercises, and made, as it really is, the Lord's Day."

Further, the excellent work of THE DISCIPLE OF CHRIST AND CANADIAN EVANGELIST was appreciated, and the editorial work of Bro. Munro, Hamilton, commended. The press were thanked for excellent reports, and the faithful work of the Board of Managers and officers also mentioned.

The report was adopted.

The following resolution touching the Manitoba school case was also adopted:

"Resolved, that we deprecate the interference, or attempted interference, on the part of the Federal Government with provincial legislation upon public school questions, especially as regards pending questions in Manitoba."

Brothers Rains and Hardin, Cincinnati, spoke in favor of the affiliation of the Ontario Co-operation with the G. C. M. C. (the sister body in the States). The question was vigorously debated, and as it was found that such action would be unconstitutional, a resolution extending sympathy and fellowship was adopted instead.

It was decided to hold the next annual meeting on the Tuesday before the first Sunday in June, 1896, in the Cecil Street Church, Toronto.—*London Advertiser*, June 3
