OBJECT. This Company is to be formed for the purpose of acquiring the property known as Lorne Park, and making it a first-class summer resort.

The property consists of 25 acres of elevated ground, and commands a splendid view of Lake Ontario. It is 16 miles from Toronto and 26 from Hamilton; it is equally accessible by rail or water, and is one of the healthiest places in Ontario. The L.P.R. track runs within 200 yards of the Park gate, and there is a substantial wharf on the lake front of the grounds. There is also an bore on the premises, with 12 great bedrooms, large dining, ice cream and lunch rooms, kitchen and servants' quarters, billiard, tennis, croquet, and other amusements, and a fine accommodation of picnic and other caterings.
