"During my stay at Burlington I got personally acquainted with most of the Gentlemen who had waited upon His R. H., they all seemed much pleased with him; and several Gentlemen in the neighbourhood, with whom I was accidentally in company, regretted exceedingly their not having had an opportunity of shewing him the same attention.
