INTERESTING RESUME

OF DUBLIN CASTLE PROCLAMA-TIONS:

How the Island was Governed in Former Days-Some Curious Documents-" Concented Lands."

A collection of the proclamations issued from Dublin Castle from time to time ought to a very considerable extent form an epitome of the political history of the country. They ought to prove quite as valuable in their way as those Protests of the Irish House of Lords which, collected some years ago by Professor Thorold Rogers, were found to be so historically interesting. We are glad to find that a catalogue of those Castle proclamations is being carefully prepared by a very competent person, Sir Bernard Burke, and a precis thereof is being published in instalments in the annual reports of the Deputy-Keeper of the Irish Records. The scope of Sir Bernard Burke's catalogue extends from 1618 to 1875. Whenever necessary it will be easy to bring this list up to the most recent date. Sir Bornard, in his twenty-first report, issued two years ago, published the first instalment of the catalogue, which extended from 1618 to 1660. In the twenty-third report of the Deputy-Keeper of the Records, which has just been issued, the catalogue is carried down from 1000 to 1707. We have just been looking through this second portion of the catalogue, and find it quite as interesting as might be find it quite as interesting as might be expected. The period covered by this batch of proclamations, from the second year of the reign of Charles II. to the eventh of that of George III., was a very interesting one in Irish history. Throughout the reign of Charles II. these proclamations give evidence of the vigor with which the persecution of the Irish and Catholics was carried on by the representative of a dynasty for which the Irish and Catholics were afterwards to display such devotion. Then came James II.'s reign, and towards its close we find proclariations issuing in the name of the King himself, then established in Dublin after his flight from England. Soon we have proclamations of William and Mary from their court in Belfast, after the victory of the Boyne. Then came the reign of Anne and the three Georges, of each of which some typical note from the history of this poor country, then going through the worst of the penal days, appears in the proclamation.
