It is grateful news to the parents to learn that, under the skillful care of Dr. Ferguson, the complaint from which the little fellow was suffering will be a thing of the past.

THE mortal remains of the late Patrick McGowan, an account of whose death appeared in our columns of last week was interred in St. Boniface cemetery on Wednesday last. Rev. Father Cloutier, who looks after the spiritual wants of the Catholics of Stony Mountain semi-monthly, and of whom deceased was one of his devoted parishioners, conducted the funeral services at Stony Mountain and also at the grave.

SUNDAY Cast being Trinity Sunday, the music at the church of the Immaculate Conception was of an especially attractive nature. During high mass the choir sang the "Gredo," the "Sanctus" and the "Agnus Dei" from Battmann's mass, the principal parts being taken by Mrs. A. Bernhart (soprano), Mrs. Buzzard (alto), Mr. Markinski (tenor), and Mr. Tomney (bass). At the offertory Mrs. Bernhart sang Milliard's "Ave Maria," which was heard for the first time in this church. The piece was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Bernhart, who possesses a sweet and sympathetic voice, exactly suited to devotional music of this kind. Rev. Father Cauthier, preached an able sermon on the feast of the day.

THE Catholic Indians of British Columbia under the direction of their priests, have made rapid advance in civilization. There are several excellent brass bands amongst them, and two or three newspapers set up entirely in shorthand. Shorthand is taught exclusively in the mission schools so that the majority of adult Catholic Indians in British Columbia are good stenographers. They will hold a great reunion—the largest ever known—in the Province—at St. Mary's Mission in June. The Indians will come from all the Fraser River reserves, Squamish, Sechelt, Cowichan, Victoria, Nanaimo, North Bend, Kamloops and other places. Particular honors are to be paid Bishop Durien by the Indians. A battery of ten cannon will be massed to herald his arrival.—New York Freeman's Journal.
