In September the government increased the budget of the Canadian Educational Assistance Program in South Africa from \$7 to \$8.2 million. This included an additional \$500 000 for labour education assistance, as well as for increased training and education in Canada. Canada also provided \$500 000 to the Commonwealth Nassau Fellowship Program for black South Africans, recipients of which will attend educational institutions in developing countries. Legal and humanitarian assistance to political detainees and their families, channelled through Canadian nongovernmental organizations, was increased by \$500 000. Canada continued to make substantial contributions to Commonwealth and UN multilateral programs assisting victims of *apartheid*.

Canada was also active in helping to strengthen the economies of South Africa's neighbours and to make them less vulnerable to South African pressure. Canada raised its commitment to \$40 million annually for SADCC, in addition to \$100 million per annum in bilateral aid to its members.

The independence of Namibia continued to be an issue to which Canada attached priority. Canada continued to press South Africa to end its illegal occupation of that territory. At Vancouver, Canada and all other Commonwealth members reaffirmed that the economic and other measures taken to pressure South Africa to dismantle
