Dear Mr Principal

Quite apart from what you might think we ought to publish, I thought you might like to know The facts in regard to the comparison of the Arts Course at McGill and the Arts Course at Toronto.

To enter Toronto in Arts a student may take what is commonly called The Pass Matriculation. This is virtually equivalent to what is called matriculation into McGill.

But all the best pupils who come up are not content with this, unless stress of circumstances controls them. They take in whole or in part what is called Honour Matriculation. This represents in each subject one year of study beyond the Pass matriculation, - one year more in classics one year more in mathematics and in English and so on. A student who takes Honour matriculation in Arts in a subject, or subjects ^{in that subject} at Toronto would find nothing to do at McGill. At Toronto he would enter a first year Honour class and go forward from the point he had reached at Honour matriculation. The session at Toronto is as long as that
