## CALLS REPORTERS GARBAGE VULTURES

Rev. S. Banks Nelson of Hamilton Says Newspapers Are Too Worldly.

## MEETINGS IN CAMERA?

Mayor Allan Doubts if Press Will Be Admitted to Hydro Sessions.

(Special to The Toronto World.)

HAMILTON, Jan. 5.—During the course of a sermon at Knox Church last night, Rev. S. Banks Nelson, minister of the Knox Church, called the press "garbage vultures" and asked them to leave the city.

"You newspaper reporters, you 'garbage vultures'," he cried in his condemnation of them, "why do you not print heart stories? Why do you give the public stories that are worldly and mean rather than those which tend to the social uplift? Right and true will continue to prevail despite the efforts of the press to teach the public that the world is growing worse instead of better."

Newspapers have too many carping criticisms to give an honest picture. Many of Dr. Nelson's references were so unusual as to raise a laugh among the members of his congregation.

There is some talk that when the Hydro Commission commences its meetings they will be closed to the press and the public. Mayor Allan said he was not in favor of such a move, but the others were, and for that reason the proposition might bear fruit. His worship said the commission governed a public utility, and that its doings should be chronicled in the daily press.

The only reason that prompted the suggestion to have the meetings closed was inspired by a desire to keep rival companies from learning the progress of the hydro.

His worship was sure the people had faith in the hydro, and it would make little difference to them whether the meetings were closed or not.

To Consider Annexes. City Councillor McEwan announced this morning that the Ontario Railway Board will convene at the city hall on Jan. 26, when the matter of annexing the city to the hydro will be considered.

Accordingly the Lake Erie, commanded by Captain Carey, and the Lake Champlain, commanded by Captain Kendall, were renamed the Tyrolia and Ruthenia, respectively, and the new service was inaugurated in the first sailing taking place in March last year. From the first, success attended the enterprise, which at that time, enjoyed the favor of the Austrian Government.
