Hon. L. P. BRODEUR (Minister of Marine and Fisheries):

COMPENSATION PAID BY RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT.

Mr. M. S. McCARTHY asked:

1. Has the Russian government paid to the owners of the British Columbia schooners 'Carmolite' and 'Vancouver Belle' the sum of \$44,701, the amount agreed upon for dam-

of \$44,701, the amount agreed upon ages for wrongful seizure?

2. Have the claims of the owners of the schooners 'Maria' and 'Rosie Olsen,' which were seized at the same time as the 'Carmolite' and 'Vancouver Belle' been recognized by the Russian government? If so, monte and vancouver belie been recog-nized by the Russian government? If so, what is the amount to be paid to the owners of these vessels? If not, on what grounds does the Russian government refuse to pay these claims?

Hon, L. P. BRODEUR (Minister of Marine

and Fisheries):

1. The government has just been informed that the award, with interest, totalling £16,-962.58 or \$82,549.77, has been paid to the High Commissioner for Canada through the Colonial Office, as the amount awarded by Russia in respect of outstanding claims.

2. No. On the ground that the evidence was sufficient to warrant the seizure of

BRITISH COLUMBIA LIFE-BOATS.

Mr. M. S. McCARTHY asked:

1. Has the government recently purchased a motor boat in the United States for life Mr. W. JACKSON.

saving purposes in British Columbia waters?
2. Is the government aware that there are several establishments in Canada which

manufacture motor boats?

3. What was the price paid for the vessel to be used in British Columbia?

4. Were Canadian motor boat builders given an opportunity for tendering for the construction of this vessel? If not, why not?

Hon. L. P. BRODEUR (Minister of Marine and Fisheries):

 Yes.
 Yes, and many Canadian establishments have turned out excellent work, but it was impracticable to employ them in this instance because it was necessary to have the boat built by a firm having experience with this special type of construction. The department consulted the United States life saving service and entrusted the work to the firm that has been almost exclusively employed by that service and at the price paid by that service.

3. \$10,900.

4. No. Because the boat was built from designs furnished by the United States life saving service, embodying all improvements in the type of self righting and self bailing life-boat suggested by the long experience and under the supervision of the constructive officer of that service, and only by giving the order to the Electric Launch Company of Bayonne, N.J., could the boat have been secured for use this winter. The boat is built of solid mahogany by men specially brought from England trained in that special lifeboat work. It would have been impossible to have secured either men or materials in time in Canada. The government, however, favours the policy of doing such work as far as possible in Canada, and if any further motor lifeboats are required, will, if practicable, have them built in Canada.
